2. COIN HOUSE 109 N. Scott St.

Saltbox built in the 1850's by Dr. G.W. Topping as an office. Moved from NW corner of Scott and Main to present site in 1910. Home of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Coin who have furnished it with antiques.


3. MYERS HOUSE 130 W. Main St.

**1. HOUSES ON TOUR
LANKFORD-HILL HOUSE
402 W. Main St.**

Modified Greek Revival, construction entirely of oak, basement beams hand hewn. Built 1841-43. Home of Lewis Lankford and Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hill.

**2. COIN HOUSE
109 N. Scott St.**

Saltbox built in the 1850's by Dr. G.W. Topping as an office. Moved from NW corner of Scott and Main to present site in 1910. Home of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Coin who have furnished it with antiques.

**3. MYERS HOUSE
130 W. Main St.**

Two story frame built by Dr. Richard Simmons about 1899. Now the home of Police Chief and Mrs. Wendell Myers.

**4. HALTERMAN-NEWMAN HOUSE
203 S. Bridge**

Two story frame built by Petter Halterman, barber, in 1908 on site of Scott's 1st Publick House. Halterman's great grandson, Brent Newman and family now live in the houses.

**5. FERGUSON HOUSE
211 E. Jefferson**

Two story frame built by Ernest Scott in 1915. Present owners Lt. Col. and Mrs. Charles Ferguson purchased the house in 1955 and have filled it with their collection of antiques.

**6. MULFORD HOUSE
407 W. Washington**

Two story bungalow built in 1915 by Charles Lorenz, recently remodeled and redecorated by Mr. and Mrs. Paul Mulford, owners since 1955.

**7. STONE HOUSE
407 E. Webb Drive**

Construct of native field stone in 1937 for A.D. Rose; unique as it has ramps instead of stairs. Now empty, will contain showing of local artist, Madeline Brockway.

**8. WOODRUFF HOUSE
210 W. Webb Drive**

Brick ranch built by retired banker Mr. Ralph Woodruff and his wife in 1958.

**9. POWELL HOUSE
841 Andover Drive**

Two story brick home of Mr. and Mrs. Ted Powell built in 1974 at a cost of \$97,000. Features a walnut paneled library, master suite with bed-sitting room and fireplace.

**10. ELLIOTT DUPLEX
40 Manchester Drive**

A 1975 home in Millbrook Meadows to be in the contemporary manner.

Sat., Oct. 4 will be De Witt's 142nd birthday and we will be celebrating it with a "HOUSES IN HISTORY" open homes tour sponsored by the Bicentennial Commission. Houses on the tour will be:

1. Lankford-Hill Home, 402 W. Main St. built in 1841-43.
2. Coin House, 109 N. Scott, built in 1850's by Dr. G. W. Topping.
3. Myers Home, 130 W. Main St. built by Dr. Richmond Simmons in 1899.
4. Halterman-Newman Home, 203 S. Bridge St. built by Peter Halterman in 1908.
5. Ferguson Home, 211 E. Jefferson, built by Ernest Scott in 1915.
6. Mulford House, 407 W. Washington St. built by Charles Lorenz in 1915.
7. Stone House, 407 E. Webb, built of native field stone for A. D. Rose in 1936.
8. Woodruff House, 210 W. Webb, brick ranch built in 1958 by the Ralph Woodruff's.
9. Powell House, 841 Andover Dr., built by Mr. & Mrs. Ted Powell in 1974.
10. Elliott House, 210 Manchester Dr., designed & built by Mr. & Mrs. Wm. Elliott.

The price of the tour is \$2.00, tickets may be purchased in advance at the Library and on day of tour at the library lobby. School buses will run every $\frac{1}{2}$ hour from in front of the Memorial Building.

In conjunction with the home tour the following places will have food:
