The DeWitt Community Church was organized as a Baptist Church in 1840 and the building was started on the corner of Bridge and Jefferson, where it still stands. The church was remodeled several times. Complete records of the early church were lost in the fire of 1929. The Methodist Church burned in 1928 and the DeWitt Community Church was incorporated on May 15, 1929. In 1967 the Community Church became a duely aligned church-Baptist and United Church of Christ.

In 1970 the present site on Webb Drive was purchased and under the able leadership and building skill of Rev. Murl Eastman the new church was built and the congregation moved on June 2, 1974.
