





Definition of "terms" .

POLICIES are statements of fundamental principles upon which all rules and procedures of the school district are based. Policies describe in general terms the educational objectives or philosophies which the Board hopes to achieve. Policies are an attempt to communicate to all interested parties a framework of basic beliefs with such force and clarity that the administration and staff may apply them to specific situations with reasonable confidence that they are reflecting the collective will of the Board. Policies must be in accordance with Michigan School Laws and adopted by the Board of Education.

A. Policy numbers shall be preceded by a letter prefix of A.

ADMINISTRATIVE RULES are statements indicating a course of action consistent with the broad general policies as established by the board of education. They are developed by the administration with the knowledge of the School Board.

A. Rule numbers shall be preceded by a letter prefix of B.

OPERATING PROCEDURES are the particular manner in which the details of these policies and administrative rules will be carried out. They are developed by the administration with staff involvement.

A. Procedure numbers shall be preceded by a letter prefix of C.

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

DeWitt Memorial Building Addition Shaping Up

The walls are up and the steel beams for the roof were to go on this week on the new addition to the DeWitt Memorial Building. The building construction blossomed rapidly in December after the association accepted a "splendid proposal" from Richard L. Corr Jr. of DeWitt to do the masonry work on a cost plus 10 per cent basis. Association officers picked out the brickwork for the front last week; the new and old buildings will have a common front, though the interiors will not be connected.

New superintendent hired at DeWitt

DeWITT — Hobart Jenkins, who has spent 16 years in the Detroit Public School system, has been appointed assistant superintendent of the DeWitt Schools, it has been announced.

Jenkins will take over the superintendent's post in July when the present superintendent, C. H. Fuersteau, retires.

Jenkins, 41, will assume his new post as assistant superintendent Feb. 2 and will serve through July 1 in that capacity.


Mrs. Sharp has been a teacher at the DeWitt Junior High School for 29 years. Prior to

coming to DeWitt in 1937, she taught three years at Allen School in Gratiot County, and six at Wheeler.

While at Wheeler she began demonstrating her versatility by serving part time as principal, and coaching the girls' basketball team.


Mrs. Sharp never kept count of the number of students she has taught, but figures there have been "several thousand." She is now teaching second generation pupils in DeWitt.



Teacher, Superintendent to Be Honored at DeWitt

DeWitt school board members, teachers and citizens, many of whom are former students of DeWitt school superintendent Clarence H. Fuerstenau and teacher Loretta Sharp, will gather at the high school gym at 2 p.m. Sunday to pay homage to these two highly respected educators, who have between them a total of 60 years service to DeWitt schools.

The DeWitt board of education decided May 1 that this would be an appropriate time to honor Superintendent Fuerstenau, who will complete his 35th year at DeWitt, and Mrs Sharp, who is finishing her 25th year. Mrs Virgil Zeeb, treasurer of the board, arranged the three-hour program with the help of the other board members' wives.

Born in Memphis, Mich., Fuerstenau attended country schools and was graduated from Richmond high school in 1919. He started teaching at DeWitt in 1923 after receiving a Bachelor of Arts degree in English and business education from Albion College.

AFTER FIVE years as a 9th and 10th grade teacher and head of the 10-grade school, he went to Laingsburg, where he was superintendent three years. Fuerstenau taught night school in Flint one year after leaving Laingsburg, returning to DeWitt in 1932 to take over his present job.

The superintendent continued his education, receiving a Master of Arts degree in economics and business administration from MSU in 1944. He was married in 1926 to the former Beatrice Bisbing of Flint.

The Fuerstenaus have two daughters, Mrs Duane (Barbara) Davis of St. Johns and Mrs Donald (Margaret) Nelson of Summit, N. J., and a son, William, married to the former Patricia Sowers of Farmington, now living in Trenton, N. J. William is attending Princeton Theological seminary. There are also six grandchildren in the family.

FUERSTENAU IS active in professional organizations and community affairs. He is a charter member of the DeWitt Lions club and belongs to the Masons and the Hi-12 club of Lansing. He served two terms on the DeWitt village council. He and Mrs Fuerstenau attend the First Presbyterian church in Lansing.

Mrs Sharp was born in Gratiot county, where she attended country schools and was graduated from Alma high school. After her marriage to LaVern Sharp and the birth of her daughter, Marjorie, she enrolled in County Normal at Ithaca.

She returned to her own country school for her first teaching assignment. She taught there three years, meanwhile attending Ferris Institute and Central Michigan University until she obtained her Life Teaching certificate.

MRS SHARP then went to Wheeler, Mich., where she taught four years and was principal two years. She came to DeWitt in 1937.

She continued her education at CMU, where she received a Bachelor of Science degree. In addition to her classroom duties, Mrs Sharp has conducted the girls glee club for the past 20 years.

Her daughter married Richard Brainerd of Bath. They have three children. Mrs Sharp attends DeWitt Community church.

OPEN HOUSE PLANNED FOR DEWITT SCHOOLS SUPERINTENDENT AND TEACHER

The DeWitt Board of Education, at its May 1 meeting, set Sunday, May 20th, from 2 to 5 p.m., as a time for recognition of the long years of service these two people have given to educating DeWitt school children (thirty-five years for Clarence H. Fuerstenau, and twenty-five years for Mrs. Loretta Sharp). The affair is to be in the high school gym. Chairman Irene Zeel, board treasurer, is in charge of the planning with help of Board members wives. The people of the community will have a golden opportunity to pay homage to these fine educators, and there-by assure them of their pride and appreciation of the long service.

Resume of Service

Clarence H. Fuerstenau, Superintendent, was born on a farm at Memphis, Michigan. One of five children, he attended country school eight years, and graduated from Richmond High School in 1919. He received his BA Degree from Albion College, graduating in 1923, majoring in English and business education. He received his Master of Arts Degree in 1944 at MSU, where he majored in Economics and Business Administration. This work was taken along with his teaching. He took his first teaching job in DeWitt in 1923, where he was head of the 10-grade school, and taught 9th and 10th grade subjects. After five years at DeWitt, he took the Superintendency at Laingsburg schools for three years. He then taught night school in Flint one year. Returning to DeWitt in 1932 as Supt., this is his 35th year in DeWitt and 38th in school work. He married Beatrice Bisbing of Flint in 1926. They have three children: Barbara, Mrs. Duane Davis of rural St. Johns; Margaret, wife of Dr. Donald Nelson, formerly of Indian Hills, Okemos, now of Summit, N. J.; William, who is married to the former Patricia Sowers of Farmington. They live in Trenton, N. J., while he attends Princeton Theological Seminary. There are six grand-children. Clarence is a Life member of the Michigan Education Association, member of the National Education Association, member of the Michigan Association of School Administrators. Locally, he is a Charter member of the DeWitt Lions Club, sonic order, Hi-12 Club of Lan-

sing, two terms on DeWitt Village Council, many years of the Boy Scout committees, treasurer of the DeWitt Recreation Association, and has worked in all community projects. He and Mrs. Fuerstenau attend First Presbyterian Church in Lansing.

Mrs. Loretta Sharp was born in the rural community of Lafayette township, Gratiot County. The youngest of five children, she attended country school eight years, then to Alma High School fifteen miles from home, making it necessary to live in Alma during the week and spending week-ends and summers at home. After marriage to Mr. LaVern Sharp, and the birth of her daughter Marjorie, she enrolled in County Normal at Ithaca. Her first teaching was in the rural school where she received her early education, just a mile and a half from home. Two of her sisters started their teaching careers in the same school. Loretta remained there 3 years, during which period she attended Ferris Institute and Central Michigan University until she obtained her Life Certificate. Her second teaching assignment was at Wheeler, Mich., where she taught the intermediate room four years, and then was Principal for two years. At that time the school was 10 grades. Since then, she has been both happy and grateful to be a teacher in DeWitt schools. While here, she continued her education at Central Michigan University, where she received her Bachelor of Science Degree. Her daughter, Marjorie, married Richard Brainerd of Bath. They have three children: Ladd, Marsha and Martha. Mrs. Sharp has been for twenty years, instructor and leader of the Girls Glee Club in DeWitt schools. She is very highly respected by her girls, and all the students who have passed through her class rooms these many years. Mrs. Sharp attends DeWitt Community Church. Of her twenty-five years, twenty have been teaching in Junior high school. Mr. and Mrs. Sharp are very proud of their grandchildren.

May God bless both these wonderful educators with good health and many useful years, yet, in DeWitt schools.



DEWITT — Jack Enderle, 28, a Lansing teacher, has been named principal of DeWitt Junior High School.

The appointment, effective Aug. 15, was made by the DeWitt Board of Education and announced by Hobart H. Jenkins, superintendent of schools.

Enderle will serve as a resource person for DeWitt schools from Jan. 30 until his appointment becomes effective. He will then succeed Otto Wakefield as junior high principal here.

The new principal currently is teaching science and physical education at C. W. Otto Junior High School in Lansing. He is a graduate of Northern Michigan University and is completing work at Michigan State University for a master's degree in school administration.
