Dill Road & Locust Street

1st Grist Mill site

This is the site of the first grist mill in Clinton County. It was built in 1844 by Jesse and Milo Turner. The water source came from damming Prairie Creek. The mill was destroyed by fire in 1901. *Designated DeWitt Historical site.*

Roberts-Post House

This house was begun for Moses Newman in 1855 and completed by Luther Southworth. Prior to the Civil War it was purchased by Shubel and Jane Vincent. Shubel died in the war and his widow then married William Roberts.

Maycroft-Huffman House

This house was built in the late 1860's by James Maycroft and was later owned by his son-in-law, David Huffman who was a stone mason. It has been greatly remodeled.

Scott-Ferguson House

This frame house is thought to have been built around 1910 by G. Earl Scott. It was later purchased by Norma and Charles Ferguson. *Designated DeWitt Historical site.*

This house was built around 1860 by Enoch Lewis. It was enlarged by Lorenzo Worden whose blacksmith shop was on the northwest corner of Bridge and Jefferson streets. It was later owned by Ronald Mull.
