When not on duty, he likes to do target practice with his pistol. He recently competed in the Governor's pistol match in Jackson. His other hobby is deer hunting.

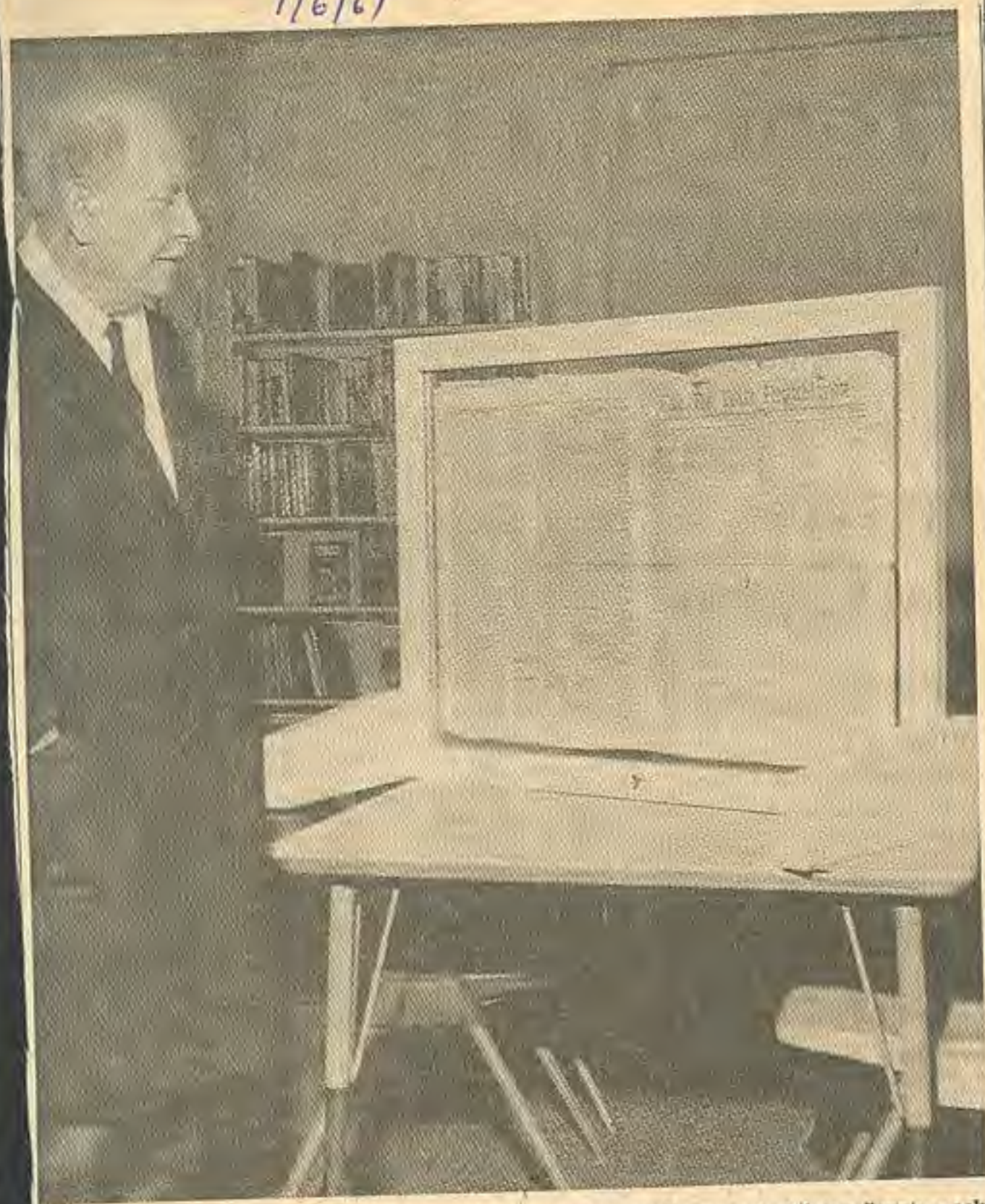
