Miss Fleda Hart Showered
With Attentions and Meets
English Royalty

American Girls Very Popular On Way
Over—Dubbed "Uncle Sam's"
Girls.

Bath, July 27.—Miss Fleda Hart, the young lady who is representing this village at the historical pageant at Bath, Eng., has written home an interesting letter describing her experiences.

Miss Hart left Bath June 28, and at Toledo met the representative of Bath, Ill. In New York city the New York state representative joined them and the girls sailed on the Lusitania the following day. They were great favorites with the hundreds of passengers, who called them "Uncle Sam's girls." A concert was given for the trio the Thursday evening before Queenstown was reached. Independence Day was appropriately celebrated with firecrackers and the singing of patriotic songs.

Liverpool was reached the morning of the 6th. A week was spent in sightseeing, the 12th being spent in a pilgrimage to Stratford-on-Avon. The pageant at Bath was inaugurated on July 20 by the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, and the American Bath girls, the party now including several others who had come on different steamers, were the recipients of flattering attentions. They were introduced to royalty and were heartily cheered by the populace wherever they appeared.

The girls were clad in silver in the pageant and represented the daughters of the mother city, Bath. The quaint old city was beautifully decorated for the fete, and thousands of strangers were present, including many Americans. Miss Hart is expected home within a few days.
