Eugene C. Brya, one of Clinton county's oldest residents, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Richard L. Bixby, last Friday evening. Mr. Brya had been ill for several weeks with paralysis.

The deceased was born in France May 18, 1834, where his boyhood days were spent. At the age of 15 years he came with his parents to America settling in Wayne county, O. In 1855, he was married to Miss Kathryn Miller, also a native of France, but living in Wayne county, O., at that time. Soon after their marriage, the couple came to Michigan settling upon a farm in Olive township, Clinton county. Mr. and Mrs. Brya resided upon this farm until about 44 years ago when they came to St. Johns to live. After making their home here for about seven years, the couple returned to their farm in Olive where Mrs. Brya died about 20 years ago. Mr. Brya continued to live upon the old homestead until 1904 when he came to make his home with his daughter, Mrs. Bixby.

Ten children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Brya, six of whom are living: Mrs. Fred Durkee of Saginaw; Eugene J. Brya of Olive; Charles Brya of Bingham, Mrs. George Zwergle of Mt. Pleasant; Mrs. Thomas Rowe and Mrs. Richard L. Bixby of St. Johns. One sister, Mrs. Lewis, Boron of Olive is also left to mourn his death.

Laingsburg—Adolph F. Brya, 63, Laingsburg business man and a native of St. Johns, passed away at 7:30 o'clock Monday night, following a long illness. He had been afflicted with a heart ailment, with complications resulting in his death. He had been confined to his bed for the past two months.

Funeral services are to be held Thursday at 1:30 p. m., from the home and at 2 o'clock from the Galbigan funeral home. Rev. M. P. Karr, retired minister, and Rev. W. J. Robinson, pastor of the Methodist church will officiate. Burial will be made in the family lot at the St. Johns cemetery.

Mr. Brya was born in St. Johns Sept. 21, 1877, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ferdinand Brya and as a small boy moved to Dewitt. On Sept. 25, 1901,

He operated a hardware store in Dewitt for some years and later bought the hardware here of Fred Lee. Later on he also purchased the hardware business owned here by Herbert L. Austin, combining the businesses. He later took his son Victor into the business as a partner, the two continuing the business up to the present.

He was a regular attendant and a supporter of the Congregational church here. He was also a member of the Masonic Lodge, I. O. O. F., and Rebekah Lodge. He was prominent in public affairs and was a member of the Village Council as a trustee until his poor health necessitated his resignation.

Surviving are the widow; the son, Victor; a brother, Theodore Brya, of St. Johns, and one granddaughter.
