Lived in Bengal 44 Years—Came
to St. Johns Eight
Years Ago.

After a year's illness with heart failure, Mrs. Warren Halsey died at her home on South Church street, at 7:30 o'clock Monday morning, aged 76 years. Funeral services were held at the home at 1:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, Rev. G. S. Northrup of Williamston, formerly of this city, officiating.

Electa L. Walker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Walker, was born at Dexter, Washtenaw county, Michigan, September 13, 1837. At the age of 10 years she removed with her parents to Ingham county, where she resided until her marriage. While there she taught school a few years.

February 18, 1862 she was united in marriage to Warren Halsey of Bengal township, Clinton county, where they resided forty-four years, coming to St. Johns eight years ago. To this union were born seven children, three sons and four daughter. One son, Willie, died in infancy, and Henry, of Olive, died about six years ago.

The children who survive her are: Frank Halsey of Riley township, Mrs. Corn Gerberich and Mrs. Emma Huggett of Olive, Mrs. Luna Coffman and Charles Halsey of Ingham, and Mrs. Sylvia Cheney of near Ithaca. 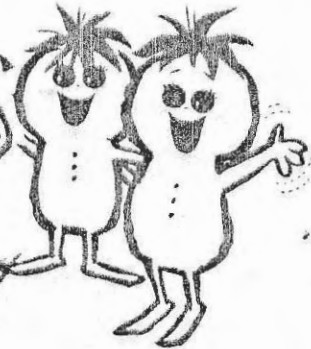
Frank G. Halsey And Wife Observe 55th Anniversary

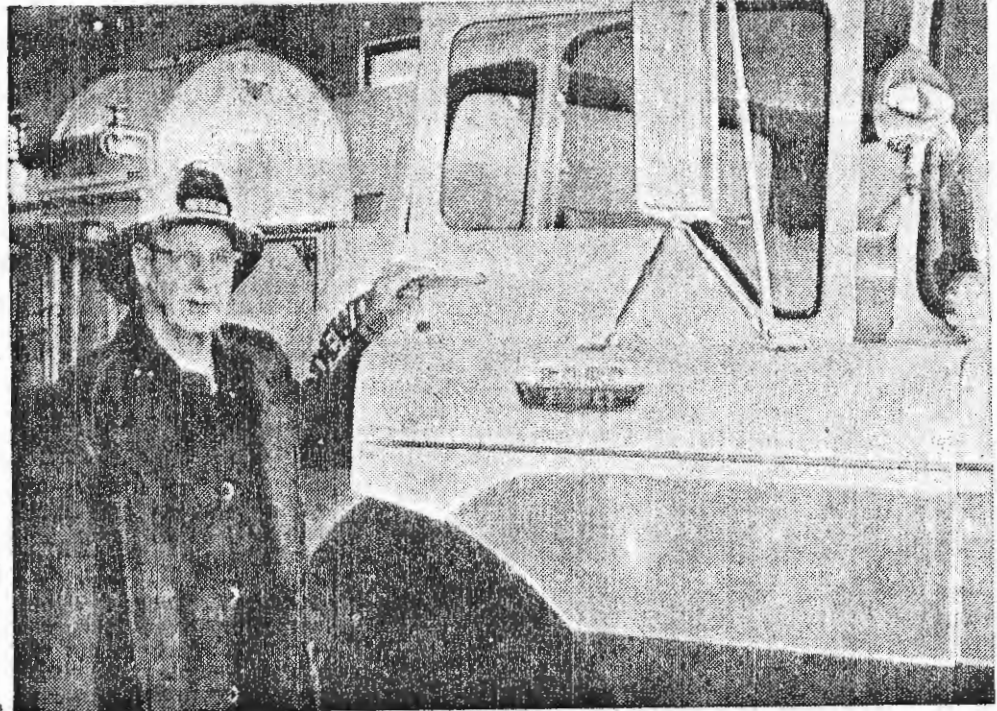
Survivors include her husband Glenn; a daughter, Mrs. Arthur Newman and two grandchildren, all of DeWitt.

DeWitt Chief Furnished Own Bucket in 1915

Halterman Fireman 50 Years

DEWITT — Glenn "Dutch" Halterman bought himself a bucket and became a fireman in 1915.

Now, over a half-century later, Halterman, 65, is still fighting fires in the DeWitt area where he has been chief of the department since 1936.

Halterman was just 15 when

he joined the DeWitt bucket brigade. Each fireman then had to furnish his own bucket, but eventually the department could afford a hand-pulled chemical wagon.

Today, the DeWitt department has two modern pumpers, a water tanker and an inhalator. Last year a \$2,000 two-way radio system was added.

Through the years Halterman has fought some of the town's

worst fires. There was the blaze in 1930 that destroyed much of the business district, and one in 1928 that razed the Methodist Church. After that came the 1936 fire that ruined the high school, and in May of 1955 the roaring fire that destroyed the elevator at the edge of town.

He became assistant chief in 1926 and chief in 1936. If you want to be technical you could say he has been chief of the DeWitt department only since January, because on that date the organization changed from a township to a city department. But it has the same manpower, same equipment and still serves half of the township.

Halterman has no monopoly on fire fighting in his family. He is the oldest of three generations on the department. His son-in-law, Art Newman, is an assistant chief, and his grandson, Brent Newman, is a regular fireman. Louis Nabberfeld Jr. is the other assistant chief.

The chief is a barber and his shop is within sight of the station. Many of his customers have been left half-shaved or half-barbered when the siren sounded. The late Fred Tucker once remarked he had never been left in the chair by "Dutch," but within four months after making that remark he was abandoned three times when

Pioneer Firefighter Dies at 69

DeWITT—Glenn A. (Dutch) Halterman, 69, DeWitt fire chief for 20 years and a barber, died Sunday in a local hospital.

Mr. Halterman served 50 years as a fireman in a career that started at the age of 16 when he bought himself a bucket and joined DeWitt's volunteer firemen "bucket brigade."

The community honored him with an open house when he retired Feb., 1967, after guiding growth of the bucket brigade into an organization with a \$35,000 fire truck.

A DeWitt resident since he was five weeks old, Mr. Halterman was the son of a barber, Peter, who began teaching him the trade when he was 12.


Mr. Halterman was a member of the Michigan State Fire Chiefs Association, Michigan State Firemans Association, Alert Firemans Association, charter member of the DeWitt Lions Club, and a Mason.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Jean Newman, a grandson and a great-granddaughter, all of DeWitt, and a sister, Mrs. Gladys Hayhoe of St. Johns.

Services will be 2 p.m. Tuesday in Lee R. Rummell Funeral Home, DeWitt, with burial in DeWitt Cemetery. Friends may contribute to their favorite cemetery or the DeWitt Fireman's Equipment Fund.

It was a long, unforgettable trip for Faye Hanson of DeWitt from an overturned bus in Greece to a hospital bed in Lansing.

In between were 14 days in two Greek hospitals and a jumble of faces—the little old, wrinkled lady with a shawl and other “beautiful Greek people,” doctors, and Red Cross and church people.

THEN CAME the 18-hour flight home on one of Aristotle Onassis’ planes to a tearful but joyful reunion with family and friends.

“Little did I dream that my first day in Greece would end in a hospital,” Mrs. Hanson said in her Sparrow Hospital room.

“I’m battered but I’m alive and I’m going to get better and travel again,” she told a friend from DeWitt who came to visit.

MRS. HANSON was among some 40 tourists on the sightseeing bus when it skidded off the highway between Athens and Corinth Oct. 31 in a heavy rain. It was their first day in Greece after eight days in Israel. Seven persons were killed and 33 injured in the accident.

“We were on our way to see Corinth, to see the hill where Paul preached and we were 15 minutes from our destination when the accident happened,” Mrs. Hanson related.

“We were taken to a small country hospital near Corinth. You can’t imagine how this upset the routine when 33 critically injured people were brought in.”

EACH GREEK patient in the hospital brought a relative who slept on a blanket beside his bed, fed him, bathed him, and gave him his bedpan, Mrs. Hanson said.

“You must take your own towels, toilet paper and everything you’re going to use,” she continued. “We had nothing. Church World Service came in and brought us necessities and asked what they could do to help us.”

She recalled the little, old Greek lady with a shawl and a long, flannel nightgown and a face “like an apple doll’s.”

“SHE FED me five days,” Mrs. Hanson said. “When she heard me moaning in the night, she would come in with a glass of water for me, pat my face and say ‘ahgapay, ahgapay.’”

Mrs. Hanson didn’t know what it meant but when she got to a hospital in Athens, she learned it was an expression of affection and love and is used in the New Testament.

“One of the most touching things that happened to me while I was there was the Greek man coming in to find out about his wife,” Mrs. Hanson related. “He spoke to me in broken English and wanted to know about the accident. His wife was our guide. She was killed. He wanted to know if she had suffered. They were a small family, he said, with no children but her mother lived with them.”

MRS. HANSON said she would think later about her cousin, Jane Martini, 57, of Pontiac who was killed in the accident. They were traveling with an 80-year-old aunt, Carrie Patterson of Wacousta, who now is in St. Lawrence Hospital.

Another Michigan resident, the Rev. Murl Eastman of DeWitt Community Church, was injured in the accident but was not hospitalized when he returned to the U.S.

Mrs. Hanson said it was good to hear English while in the Greek hospital. It seemed to her as if everyone spoke Greek.

DESPITE THE problems of no relatives beside the bed and almost constant pain, she managed to enrich her Greek vocabulary with the phrases “please,” “thank you,” “I hurt here,” and “I want a bedpan.” It took three days before she learned the last essential phrase.

“When a Red Cross lady came in, we were singing at the top of our voices,” Mrs. Hanson said. “The tears were running down her face as she listened to us.

“We felt by singing we were breathing deeply and this was helping us to not get pneumonia which could happen when you’re constantly lying in bed. We prayed, too.”

A RED Cross worker taught them the Greek for “God be with you” which Mrs. Hanson said was nice to know for Greek visitors.

And there were those. One night the mayor brought a specialty dessert. Another night the hospital president and his wife brought each American patient a box of Greek

candy. A sister from the Greek Orthodox Church brought a Greek sweet on a Sunday night visit.

“They patted each of us on the hand, and you could tell from their expressions they were sympathizing with us,” Mrs. Hanson said.

“I FEEL so badly because I think we upset their whole routine. We’re very pampered here in our hospitals.”

Another welcome visitor was the pastor of the St. Andrew’s American Church who came to see Mrs. Hanson when she and her companions were transferred to a hospital in Athens. She was admitted to an orthopedic hospital next to the University of Athens.

Seven doctors worked on her, she said. Her crushed right hand and arm was reset. Mrs. Hanson was scheduled to undergo surgery Thursday in Sparrow Hospital on her hand and arm. She also will have to undergo surgery for injuries covering an area on the top of her head where her hair has been cut away.

SHE HOPED to be home with her husband, Leo, for Thanksgiving but knows it will be a while before she gets back to her job as librarian for DeWitt city and township.

She has started to think about Christmas, however, and instead of sending her usual 500 to 600 Christmas cards, Mrs. Hanson is sending money to the Red Cross, Church World Service, and St. Andrew’s American Church in Greece.

“This experience is not going to stop me from traveling,” Mrs. Hanson vowed. “As soon as I get healed, I’m going back to Greece to see all those places I missed.”

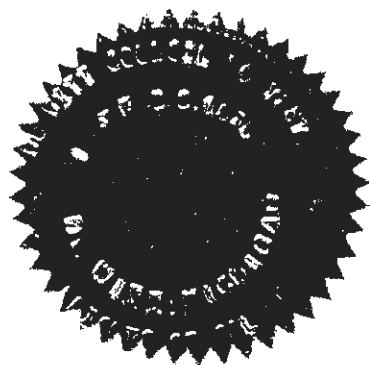

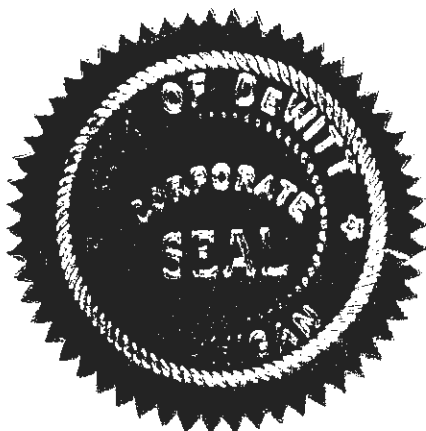

Scotland friendly, correspondent says

Mrs Leo J. Hanson, DeWitt correspondent, recently returned from a 3-week tour in Europe. Following, is an account of her trip, as she wrote it.

"I have just returned from 3 weeks in England, Scotland and Wales. Everything there is a beautiful green and everyone must have a green thumb. Even people living in apartments in London have flower boxes on their window sills. Most factories had flower gardens in front of them.

The rain probably helps to keep things green. Every Englishman carries an umbrella, not because he thinks it's going to rain but because he knows it's going to rain some time during the day. The sun usually shines a little too.

The service there, even in the small inns and hotels, is much more formal than it is in America. You are given at least nine pieces of silverware to use, even for breakfast. At lunch, you are served by a waiter in tails and a black tie and in the evening in tails and white tie.

I arrived in London by plane and traveled 1981 miles on a Global Tour. I think the most impressive sight I saw was Stonehenge, a prehistoric stone structure on Salisbury Plain, England.

I was impressed with Edinburgh, Scotland, as being friendly. We watched the Scottish National Dances in the park on Princes Street and went to see Andy Stewart, a Scottish Comic who also dances and sings, at Kings Theatre. We also visited

the Castle, Holyrood Palace and St. Giles Cathedral.

I went to Coventry, prepared not to like the new Cathedral. After visiting York, Winchester, Salisbury, Wells, Chester and Carlisle Cathedrals I was sure that modern architects could not capture the feeling of awe and reverence of the old master masons, but I was wrong. From the outside, I thought it to be cold and haughty looking, but once inside, it was magnificent, capturing the same feeling of height and warmth that is in the old cathedrals.

The Highland Mountains were covered with heather and it was in full bloom. As far as the eye could see, there was a sea of purple.

It snowed a little while we were in Aberdeen but the sun soon melted the snow. Aberdeen is so far north that it didn't get dark until 11:30 p.m. We visited the granite quarries there. All the buildings are of granite in this city and it is one of the cleanest looking places I've ever been in.

Loch Lomond is beautiful but I much preferred Loch Ard at Aberfoyle. It is one of the most peaceful spots that I've visited.

We passed over the Devils Elbow in the Scottish Mountains and came down Dee side past Balmoral Castle and spent the next two nights in Perth.

Returning to England, we came through Sherwood Forest to Nottingham where we lunched and shopped for Nottingham lace. We spent the night in Warwick and

drove over to Stratford on Avon to attend the Shakespearian Theatre. We saw "The Jew of Malta" by Christopher Marlow. The next day, we went back to Stratford to visit Shakespeare's birthplace, his grave and Ann Hathway's Cottage. I took a bus man's holiday here and spent an hour in their public library.

We visited the Colleges at Oxford, Blenheim Palace and Winston Churchill's grave then went back to London via Henley on Thames where the yacht races take place.

I visited the small inns, the pubs and have made many friends in Britain.



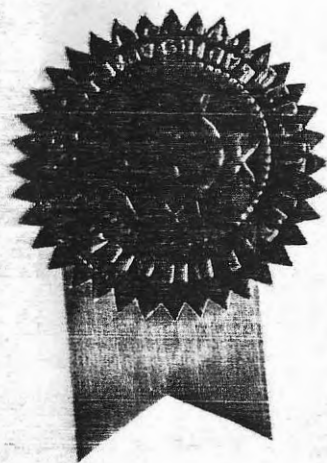

DeWitt's Faye Hanson honored by community

DEWITT — People in DeWitt can talk for hours about all the good things Faye Hanson has done for the community.

Last week it was DeWitt's turn to do something for her. Monday the city council made the DeWitt Township resident an honorary citizen of the city and recommended that the library be renamed in her honor. Thursday the library board did just that.

"SHE WAS THE library," said Milver Brunton, chairman of the board. "She really worked. She made the library what it is today."

Judy Jarrett, assistant librarian, agreed. "She was born a librarian," Jarrett said. "She was here off and on all the time."

Hanson, DeWitt's librarian for more than 22 years, has been in Sparrow Hospital since Dec. 21, a cancer patient who is not expected to live much longer. The diagnosis came as a surprise Dec. 30.

"I came in after the first of the year," said Lawrence Arbanas, a science and health teacher at DeWitt Middle School. "And she told me right off she was dying. Right in the hospital room she had everything organized. That's just the way she was, the funeral plans, everything. I just couldn't be-

lieve it. I knew this was a powerful person who is leaving us."

ARBANAS PUT into motion the plans that eventually resulted in renaming the library.

"This is what she used to do," said Arbanas, who worked with Hanson on DeWitt's bicentennial plans, local history courses in the middle school, and a filmstrip. "I said, 'I've got the strength. I can do it.' I came out and got all my phone numbers and just started calling everybody. And everybody I called was so enthusiastic and agreed this is what should be done."

Local historians claim Hanson as one of their own. In 1980 she was appointed to the Clinton County Historical Commission.

"She did a great deal of work with every civic group of every

age," said Geneva Wiskemann, chairman of the county commission. Hanson made contributions to the DeWitt Bicentennial publications, the new Clinton County history, and worked with Arbanas on a slide/filmstrip presentation of the history of the Clinton House Hotel.

"SHE WAS AN avid collector of primary sources relating to the local area," Wiskemann said. Hanson stashed old school records, photos, and other local documents in the library. She was working on the Heritage Conservation Survey, assessing old bridges, sites, and buildings for historical value, until her illness intervened.

Hanson, 60, was born in Lansing and graduated from Lansing's Central High School in 1938. She married Leo Hanson that same year and had their first baby the following year.

The Hansons have five children, Linda, Gary, Crystal, Jan, and Herb; 16 grandchildren, and one great grandchild.

Her husband was a farmer in the early years, keeping a dairy herd for some time and planting field crops. Most recently he was a school janitor and has since retired.

"IF YOU WANTED anything done you asked Faye because it would be done with enthusiasm," said Dorothy Keck, one of Hanson's friends.
