Robert Lee Plowman, 66, of Alma, former resident of Wacousta, succumbed to a critical attack of pneumonia on New Year's Day at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Arley Azelborn in Alma.

Mr. Plowman had been ill for only a week, and with his wife and children had enjoyed a delightful family gathering on Christmas. The day following the holiday he walked down town on two occasions and returning home the last time went to bed never to get up again. Every care was given the patient but he grew rapidly worse until the end came Friday.

Funeral rites were held Monday morning, Jan. 4, at Moody's funeral home in Alma at 10 o'clock and Rev. Albert J. Anthony of the Presbyterian church conducted the service. The body was then taken to Wacousta for burial in Mr. Plowman's boyhood community. Pallbearers were relatives of the deceased.

Mr. Plowman was born in Clinton county near Wacousta, on Mar. 8, 1870, and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Saron Plowman. With his wife, Clara, and their family, he went to Alma 20 years ago and had carried on his mechanic's trade there since that time. With his two brothers, Charles and Ray Plowman, he was well known in that community as an industrious, hard-working man whose chief interest lay in taking care of his wife and children comfortably.

DEWITT—Ray S. Price is a man who wears many hats, but actually his main headgear consists of a rabbit skin cap.

Price, 69, retired as Lansing cashier of the New York Central Railroad three years ago, but now he's head over heels in municipal affairs.

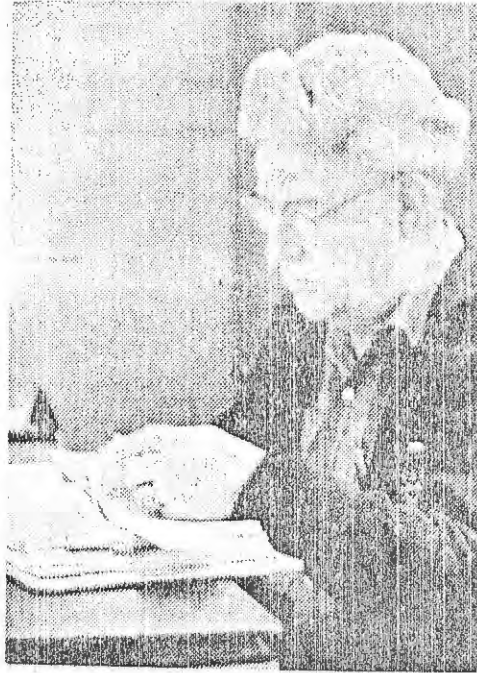
He began as village clerk six years ago. DeWitt was incorporated as a municipality last June 10, and now he carries the title of city clerk.

But that's not all. Price is also street commissioner, sewage plant supervisor and a member of the Clinton County Board of Supervisors.

While he has no official connection with the DeWitt city cemetery, he's often called upon to help the sexton. His office adjoins the fire hall, so he frequently keeps one ear cocked to hear the telephone.

DeWitt has a volunteer department, consisting of Fire Chief Glen Halterman and 18 firemen.

"We're furnishing DeWitt Township fire protection to Clark Road until the township gets its own engine," said Price. "The new equipment is expected to arrive any day now at the Valley Farms fire station."



DeWitt has a population of 1,238, according to the 1960 census, but Price estimates it has since grown to 1,400. The new city will get bigger if some of the proposed annexations materialize, and then he may inherit additional duties.
