

Autopsy to Determine Cause  
of Death; Funeral Rites  
Will Be Held Friday

Mrs. Maud Devereaux Ridenour, aged 34, a native of Olive township and a graduate of the Clinton County Normal who taught several years in the rural schools of the county, died at St. Lawrence hospital, Lansing, Tuesday, February 23, 1930. On the preceding Thursday afternoon at the country school in Ingham township where she was engaged as the teacher, she was found in an unconscious condition brought on, it is believed, either through some sudden illness or poison in some form. She was removed to the hospital where it is reported pneumonia developed and caused her death. Lansing papers stated Wednesday that an autopsy would be performed in the effort to determine the exact cause of death. Her late husband, William Ridenour, former Clinton county young man, died January 3, 1930.

Maud Devereaux was born in Olive 34 years ago, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Devereaux. She received her schooling in Dewitt and St. Johns. She was a teacher before her marriage to William Ridenour in 1913 and continued in her profession after her marriage. She is survived by her parents, one sister, Mrs. Gertrude Todd of Battle Creek, and one brother, Lynn Devereaux of St. Johns. The funeral, which will be private, will be held from her home in Lansing Friday at 3 p. m. with burial at Dewitt. Her parents' home is in Dewitt but since the death of Mr. Ridenour they have been living with their daughter in Lansing.

## William Ridenour, Former Resident Of Dewitt, Dies

Dewitt—William George Ridenour, son of George and Edith Ridenour, and one of a family of eight children, was born June 5, 1895, in Greenbush, Clinton county, Michigan. When he was 12 years of age his parents moved to Riley township. His education was received in the schools of his home districts and by his keen observation and making the most of his opportunities he developed into a self made man.

He was united in marriage to Miss Maude Devereaux of Bingham township, Oct. 25, 1913. After a few years spent in Dewitt and Olive they settled in Lansing where he had a position as country general salesman of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana for eight years.



## BATH'S OLDEST CITIZEN

SILAS W. ROSE WAS THE PIONEER OF HIS NEIGHBORHOOD.

BATH, May 2.—In the death of Silas W. Rose, Bath loses another sturdy pioneer citizen. He was born in Bath, Steuben county, New York, April 20, 1833, and with his parents came to Michigan in 1836. About two years later his father took up a tract of government land on the north shore of what is called Rose Lake, where Silas lived continuously until his death April 18, 1911. Out of a family of nine children but two are left: Wm. H. Rose of Bath and Mrs. Caroline Darrow of Mason. On Sept. 14, 1853, Silas was married to Miss Betsy Fletcher, who with her son, George A. Rose and Mrs. C. R. Murray survive him. Besides being a successful farmer Silas was a good carpenter and the Rose church, school house and many other buildings in Bath and vicinity stand today as monuments of his work. He was ever a staunch republican and for several years held the office of justice of the peace and other positions of trust.

About three years ago he was stricken with slight paralysis from which he never fully recovered, and had been gradually failing in health ever since. He was buried from the Rose church April 20, Rev. Ralph Barry officiating.

CIVIL WAR VET  
DIES AT DE WITT

S. W. Newman, 79, Former Lansing Resident, Succumbs After Long Illness

DE WITT, July 2.—Silas Wheeler Newman, 79, died at his home on W. Main street, Wednesday night, June 30 at 9:47 o'clock after a lingering illness that followed a stroke of paralysis five years ago.

He was the oldest of a family of five children and was born in Bath township, Aug. 7, 1847. His parents, Miles and Louise Newman were among the early settlers of this county.

In 1862 Mr. Newman responded to the nation's call for volunteers and enlisted in Company H, Second Michigan volunteer cavalry and participated in 32 engagements under that valiant leader, General Phil Sheridan. After his discharge from the service he returned to his home and on Sept. 13, 1868 he married Miss Ella Amanda Everett of Olive township. About six years ago Mr. and Mrs. Newman took up their residence at this place coming from Lansing. He was a member of Charles T. Foster Post, G. A. R. of Lansing and delighted in relating incidences during his service in the sixties.

He is survived by his widow and six children, two daughters, Mrs. Sarah Youry, of Bath, Mrs. Eva Owen of Blaine, Wash., four sons, William of Lansing, Claude of Lansingburg, Miles and Robert of this place; two sisters, Mrs. Ada Schools of Olive and 11 grandchildren.
