Growth Management: It all started with a Facility Study

In the fall of 2005, the DeWitt Board of Education contracted with Kingscott Associates, an architecture, engineering, interior design, and educational planning firm, to assess the condition of district facilities. To complete the study, the firm visited all district buildings, reviewed building drawings and specifications, and met with district staff to evaluate district facilities as compared to current educational standards. Information gathered by the contracted firm included site work, general construction work, mechanical, plumbing, electrical, technology and furniture and equipment needs.

In addition to a review of district facilities, the board also contracted with Wright & Hunter, a technology advisor, who reviewed the district's technology infrastructure and provided a recommendation for updates and upgrades to increase user capacity. The technology report includes recommendations such as installation of new cable links for educational television viewing, upgrading telephone and paging equipment, building clock systems, and video distribution systems.

Once district facilities were reviewed, a report was prepared that described the general condition of the facilities and estimated construction cost for recommended repairs and upgrades. The report included a general timeframe for construction and prioritized the repairs into three levels for district consideration – 0-3 years for repairs needed soon, 3-5 years for anticipated repairs and 5-10 years for other repairs and renovations that might

need to occur or would be nice to complete. The district has begun to make the maintenance suggested in the 3 year level.

In addition to the facility review and recommendations, the consultant also provided information regarding projected enrollments and suggested a reconfiguration of grades within existing school buildings to better match students with building capacities.

In August, after discussing other options, the board of education directed the superintendent to further study and develop a reasonable plan for changing building grade levels as recommended by Kingscott. To do so, a task force of district administrators, staff and parents was formed to consider parameters for completing such a plan. Information regarding curriculum and programming, facility, budget, student interests, future district needs, and communication were considered and included. These parameters were then given to the district's administrative team to develop action plans that identify steps necessary to implement

a plan for moving grades into the different building reconfiguration. The superintendent's recommendation was to delay considering such a plan due to less than anticipated enrollment and reconsider only if absolutely necessary. The superintendent's recommendation will appear on the board's December 2006 agenda. The board will also consider the parameters recommended by the task force, administration action plans, updated financial and enrollment reports, and other feedback and options prior to implementing any grade reconfiguration.

DeWitt Public Schools is fortunate to experience growth in the district and the development of

housing and business would suggest that the district's growth will continue into the future. The board and administration are looking at all options and creative solutions to handle student growth, even if slowed by a sluggish economy. As a result, planning for the district's future is important for the success of students and community.

The board and superintendent are responsible for preserving student interests and in doing so, they consider many issues related to growth in the district before making a decision. Please monitor local media and the district's website for more information.

Strategic planning for the district

Last year, a committee of staff, board, and community members worked together to develop a strategic plan for the district to provide direction for the next three to five years. As part of the strategic planning process, a mission statement, vision statement and guiding principles were developed.

Following the development of the mission statement, vision statement and guiding principles, staff from each department and building developed action plans to set a course for the upcoming months. Each action plan identifies a specific area of focus known as an Indicator of Success. In addition, each action plan identifies the State of Michigan's School Improvement Strand which are established by the Michigan Department of Education as a focus to assure district operations are aligned with state requirements related to budget, curriculum and staff qualifications.

In the past months, staff members have referred to the action plans as they work to complete these goals. The district action plans, which provide an overall guide for district operations, include:

- All students achieve at high levels.
- All students will learn in an environment that supports the whole child.
- As the district grows, resources will continue to be allocated to promote student achievement, quality programs, and state of the art innovations.
- All support staff contribute to positive learning readiness and provide a welcoming and helpful environment to everyone.
- All staff will engage in professional learning to enhance service to students and families.
- Establish two-way communication with relevant community groups about district activities and programs.
- To comply with all state mandates for information collection management, and reporting.
- The budget process is standardized for comparison, evaluation, and decision-making purposes.

As with many strategic planning processes, a review and progress component was established to ensure staff members school improvement efforts are aligned with the strategic plan in the work that is completed. Staff will continue to monitor the work completed as it relates to the strategic plan and a status report will be provided to the board of education in January 2007.

Important Schedule Information for High School Students

On March 13 & 14, only 11th grade students will attend school to take the MME/ACT exam. Students in 9th, 10th, and 12th grades will not attend school on March 13 & 14, 2007.

It Takes Work to Keep Facilities and Equipment Up and Running

As with any homeowner, DeWitt Public Schools continues to monitor its facilities and equipment for repair and maintenance throughout the year. And, if you are a homeowner, you are aware of the many issues that can arise, from a leaky faucet to a leaking roofs to a computer that has crashed. Like you, our district monitors facilities and equipment to extend the life of as long as possible, but just like home, repair and maintenance issues can be set aside or placed lower on the priority list when budgets are tight. When school funds are limited it is difficult to chose between a new

boiler and classroom programs.

Summer may seem like a quiet time for school districts, but it is most often busier in our buildings during the summer than during the school year. During these weeks of summer vacation for teaching staff and students, custodial and technology staff can put more focus on heating and cooling systems, address electrical and mechanical issues, and make major repairs and renovations to technology equipment. This isn't to say this work isn't completed during the school year, but the summer does allow more time for these activities.

During this time, custodial staff

have the opportunity to perform more intense cleaning and maintenance than during the school year. Annual inspections are completed by district staff on building fire notification systems, backup electrical systems, all bleachers, and auditorium equipment at the high school, however, while some routine summer maintenance projects are contracted because they require more specialized training. These include boiler inspection and maintenance, roof repairs, and parking lot patching.

replacement of the boiler heating system at Herbison Woods School. The system was put into operation the first week of October; just in time for our cool fall weather. The main pump and water heaters were replaced at the high school swimming pool, as well as the glass wall surrounding the high school office area. In addition to patching of parking lots and drives, the asphalt bus lane was repaved at Fuerstenau Early Childhood Center.

While our custodial and maintenance staff is working on our facilities, our technology staff is working on our technology equipment. During the summer months, all 950 computers were "ghosted"

to clean the computer and restore software settings. This past summer three elementary computer labs were upgraded with new equipment and software. With this installation, all district media labs are now running Microsoft® XP. But continued upgrades are costly, and many computers are outdated and not able to run all software options available to teachers and staff. As with our facility staff, technology staff members work to maintain aging computers and projection equipment that is used so widely in classroom instruction.

With six school buildings, transportation garage, and outdoor fields, attention to facilities and technology needs is a daily job for the district's custodial

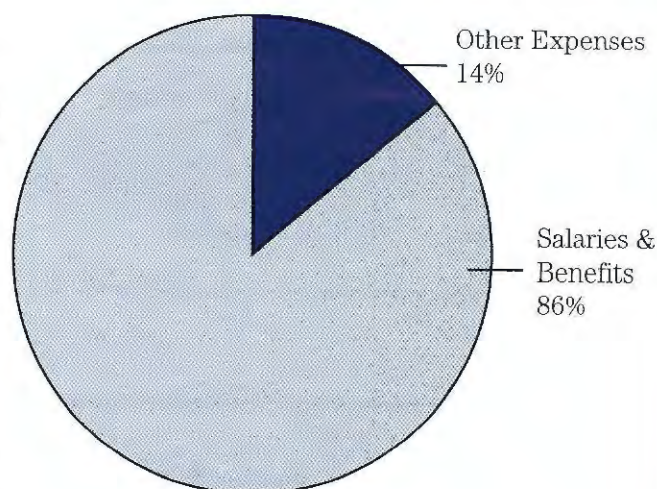
and technology staff. And, with the ever-challenging school funding environment, the district struggles to find ways to continue funding district maintenance through the general fund, so that programming is not adversely impacted.

FACTS

The district maintains and operates nearly 950 computers.

There are nearly 590,000 square feet in district facilities. And, nearly 100 acres of grounds.

How the Budget is Spent



DeWitt Board of Education

The board of education meets monthly to conduct the district's business. These meetings, set for the second Monday of the month, begin at 7:00 p.m. and are held at the board of education office located at the south end of DeWitt Junior High School. Much of the district's operation must be approved by the board, including district policy, budget, and personnel matters.

To prepare for board meetings and to gain more in-depth information about district operations, a work session is held on the fourth

Monday of the month, with the exception of December. At a work session, members receive information from staff members to learn more about the district and to discuss various topics and their impact on district operations.

All board meetings are and work sessions are open to the public and agendas are posted on the district's website prior to the meeting. Monthly meeting minutes and Board Briefs are also posted to the website for community information.

The district benefits from the work of the school board and

encourages community members to consider their role in serving the school community. Board members serve a four-year term and are elected into office. One position will be open for election in May 2007.

For more information and learning about the role of the board, contact a board member, or go to the district website. An informational meeting will be held in the spring for those interested in running for office.

New Technology and Facility Repair Spending at a Glance

During the past few years, the district's operational budget has included funding for district technology. Most recently, the board approved \$90,000 in the 2006-07 budget to be used to purchase new equipment for computer labs at the

elementary level. Due to continued advancements in technology, the district is challenged to maintain computers and software that can support current educational computer programs. Based on industry standards, about one-fourth of the district computers are "current" in

the sense of hardware and software upgrades.

Funding was approved in the 2006-07 budget to support facility and maintenance repairs. Most recently, the boilers at Herbison Woods School were replaced at a cost of \$231,000, water heaters at the high school pool were replaced at a cost of \$25,000 and replacement of the district's radio system for \$18,000. These projects were funded from the capital projects improvements fund, which was money specifically earmarked pay for such repairs.

Enrollment History

DeWitt Public Schools has experienced steady student growth for the last several years and this year was no exception. As of September 27, 2006, enrollment for students in all grades, kindergarten — 12th, equaled 2987.

Each year the State of Michigan designates two days in which school districts count their students. For this

school year, students were counted on September 27, 2006, and will again be counted on February 14, 2007. A formula is then used to determine how many students the district has and how much funding will be received from the state. The per pupil funding, or Foundation Grant, was increased to \$7,085 for the 2006-07 school year.

How Schools Get Their Money

When Proposal A was passed in 1993, the way schools were funded was changed. As a result, schools can no longer ask their voters to pass a tax levy for general operational funding that would be used to pay for salaries, utility bills, and other supplies. Funding for these items is supported through the state's foundation grant.

Following are descriptions of the usual school funding methods:

Foundation Grant – This is the amount of money per student that the State of Michigan pays each school district. This year, the Foundation Grant for DeWitt Public Schools is \$7,085 per student. With a student count of 2,987, DeWitt Schools will receive \$21.2 million in state aid.

Millage – In some cases, a millage can be presented to the voters. These millages are specific to school programming. Currently, the district receives funding from a county-wide Special Education millage and a Vocational Education millage. These millages are supported by the voters at a general election.

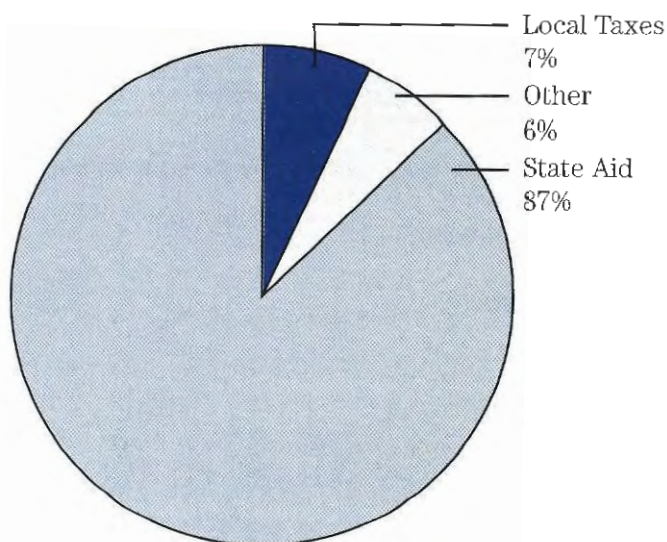
Operating Millage Renewal Proposal (Headlee Amendment) – When Proposal A was implemented, the school funding formula included a provision for each school district to collect up to 18 mills from non-homestead property. The State of Michigan assumes that each district is collecting the 18 mills and will not make any funding adjustments to reimburse the district if it is not collected. As a result, voters in each school district must approve a resolution which allows the district to collect these funds or the district will lose funding.

Non-Homestead Millage Renewal (Headlee Rollback) – Over time, due to inflation, adjustments are made to property values. When this happens, the school district is not able to collect the full 18 mills on non-homestead property as approved by voters (Headlee Amendment). In these situations, a Headlee Rollback election is then held to restore the district's ability to collect the full 18 mills as allowed by law. Headlee Rollback elections are often held on an annual basis to stay current with the rate of inflation.

Sinking Fund – A sinking fund is considered a pay-as-you-go funding method. A sinking fund can only be used for repairs, replacements and other facility related expenses. It can not be used for general operational expenses and must be approved by voters.

Bond Issue – A bond issue supports major renovations and building within the district. Voters in the district approved a \$48 million bond issue in 1996 to pay for the construction of the new high school and remodeling of other school buildings. This debt is part of the property tax assessed in the district and it is anticipated that it will be paid off in 2025.
