This is a snapshot of the SCHAVEY HOUSE taken about 1915 with Winfield Welton standing in front. The house was built in 1886 by Theodore W. Schoewe (angelized by later generations to Schavey.) The PORTRAIT AND BIOGRAPHICAL ALBUM OF CLINTON & SHIAWASSEE COUNTIES HAS THIS TO SAY: "Theodore W. Schoewe, a prominent and wealthy German-American citizen of DeWitt Township, Clinton County, has one of the finest brick farm residences in that county. It is beautifully situated on the south bank of the Looking Glass River about one mile west of the village of DeWitt. (Now within the city limits)

Mr. Schoewe came to this country in 1854 at the age of 11. He came to Michigan at the age of 25 and worked in Detroit at the Michigan Central Railway shops for 2 years at \$55.00 per month, then he returned to Ohio and bought 48 acres of land from his father, and later received the 27 acres which was his share of the estate. He farmed there until November of 1872, after which he bought 80 acres in DeWitt Township, about one mile south of his present residence. After about 3 years he exchanged that property for his present farm. He married Rebecca Heitmeyer Sept. 6, 1864. They had 10 children."

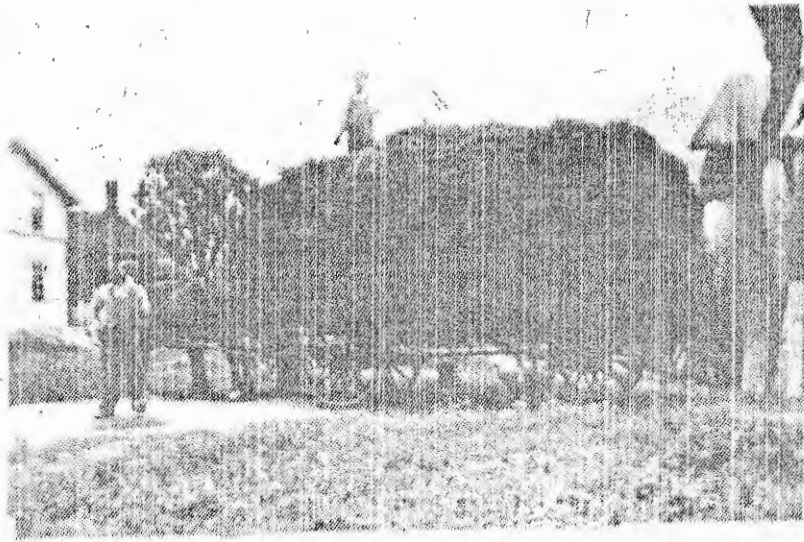

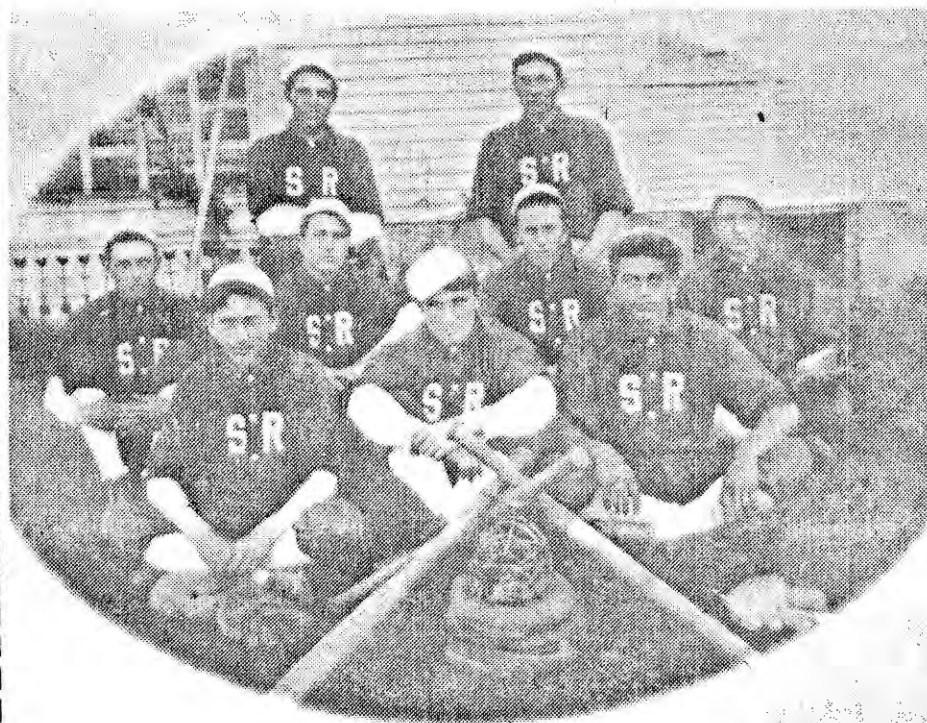

THE COMING OF THE TELEPHONE TO DEWITT, probably between 1910 and 1915. This shows farmers bringing loads of poles into town.

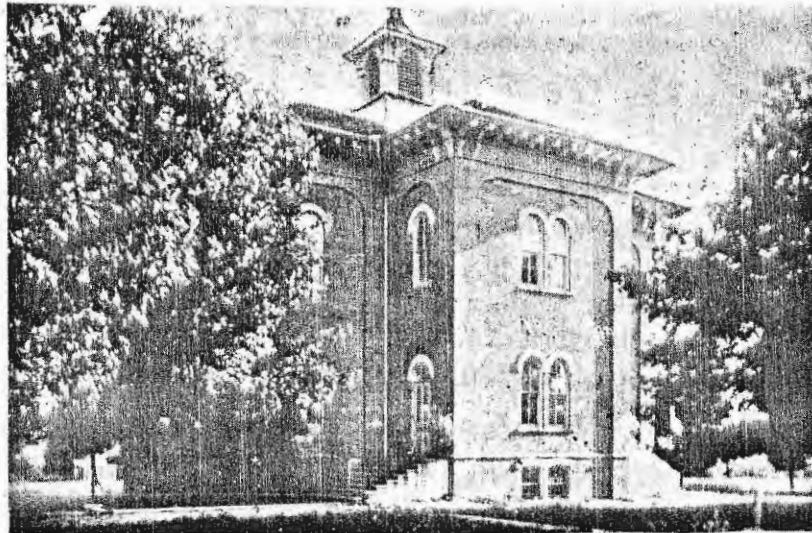
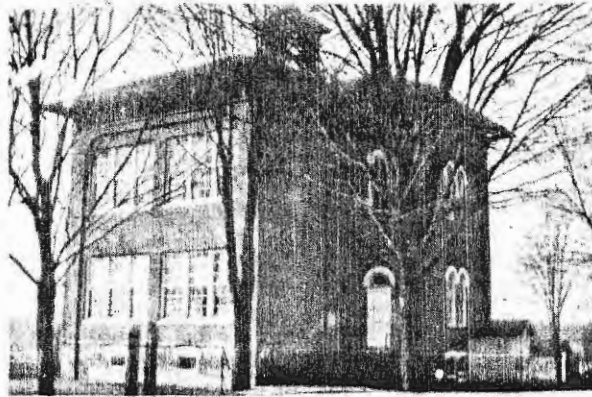

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TWO VIEWS OF THE OLD DEWITT SCHOOL

The earliest school building was a log structure erected on Sec. 7, upon the farm of Alanson Goodrich and known as the "Goodrich School House". This school stood at the foot of what is now Schavay Road. Miss Betsey Gooch was the first teacher.

The second school was built in district 2 in the village of DeWitt in 1840 on the site of the Fuerstenau school. Both Dr. Seth P. Marvin and J. H. Adams are given as early teachers. This building was replaced by one of more extended proportions, in which the sessions of the court were held for a time, it having been at that time the most pretentious structure at the County seat.

In 1870 the brick school pictured here was built with Prof. Coriel as principal, Miss Edith Williams as assistant and Miss Josie Holmes as intermediate principal.

This school burned in 1936 just before the main part of the Fuerstenau building was ready for occupancy.

One picture was given to the library by the late Helen Dills Stampfly and the other by Joyce Carey Miller, now a teacher in Hastings.

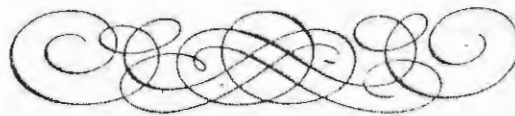
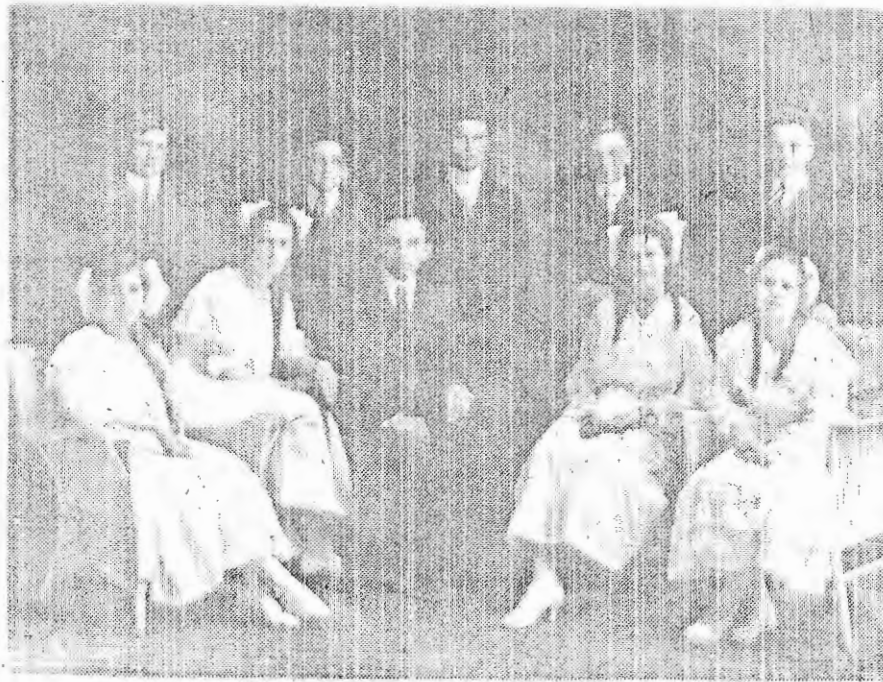

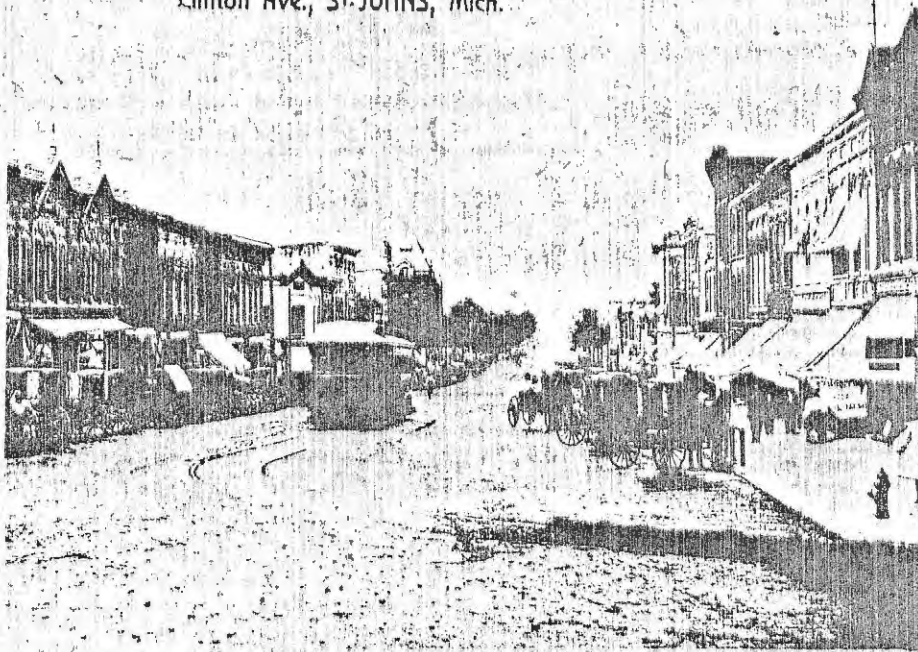

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FRIDAY, CIVIC LEADERS marked the 141st anniversary of DeWitt's founding by dedicating the first phase of West River Park (6 blocks west of the traffic light, on Main Street) and receiving the first of several large hand-carved city limit signs welcoming people to "Historic DeWitt - Founded Oct. 4, 1833". These signs are hand-carved from redwood planks by Lansing craftsman, Leon (Jake) Smeltzer.

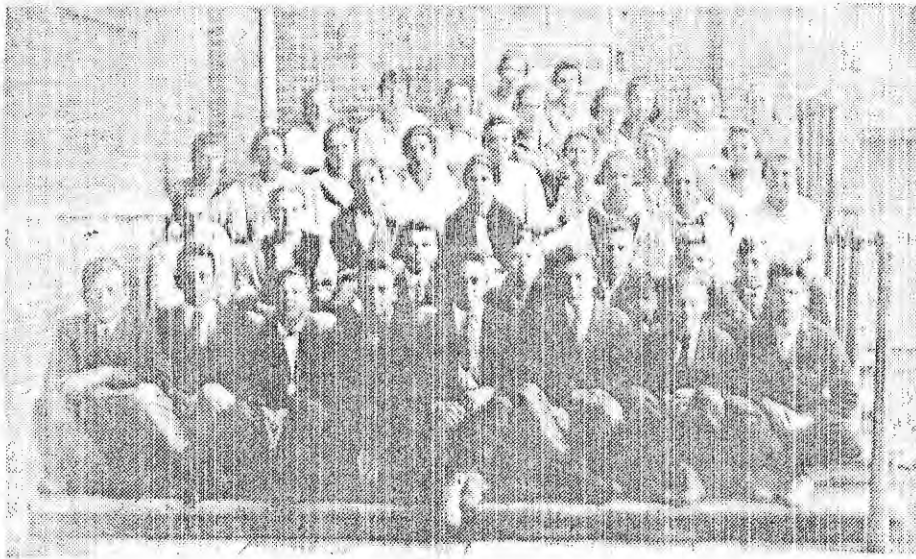
The signs are being hung at the three principal entrances to the city: the grounds of the Franciscan Retreat, the New England style Community Church and the new West River Park serving as wooded settings for the red, white and blue signs. They were given to the city by American Bank and Trust, Michigan Beef Co., and by Millbrook Meadows, Inc.

Founder's Day Ceremonies also kicked off DeWitt's Bi-Centennial plans which will culminate with a week long celebration the week of July the Fourth, 1976. Many plans are under way to restore historical sites in the area and to make people in DeWitt aware of their heritage. In 1976 we will be celebrating our 143rd birthday as well as our country's 200th birthday. Those on the Bi-Centennial Commission are Faye Hanson, Chairman; Eleanor McKinney, Secretary; Ralph Woodruff, Orla McGuire, Marilyn Coin, Larry Arbanus and Ted Powell, with Mayor Murl Eastman as ex-officio member.

The first roads through this part of Michigan ran through DeWitt. The Grand River Trail followed the north side of the Looking Glass River from its junction with the Grand in Portland, Ionia County, through southern Clinton County, through DeWitt village to Laingsburg, and continued from there through Indian villages in Shiawassee, Genesee and Oakland Counties finally connecting Clinton County with Pontiac and Detroit. Another trail led through central Clinton from Maple Rapids to the present site of DeWitt city, then Scott's tavern, crossing the Grand River trail and the Looking Glass River and was lost in Ingham County. This was many years before Lansing came into existence. The Pontiac and Grand River road was one of the most prominent of these primitive highways. This route lay from Pontiac to Ionia and crossed Clinton County from its eastern to western line. Its course ran as follows: from Pontiac westward in Oakland County to Hillman's Tavern in Tyrone Township of Livingston County, on through Shiawassee County striking Byron, Fremont, Hartwellville and Laingsburg; into Clinton through DeWitt and Wacousta terminating by way of Portland in Lyons, Ionia County. Parts of this first road are incorporated in Round Lake Road. This is why it doesn't run in a straight line. When the road enters Shiawassee County it is called the Grand River Trail. The Grand River Turnpike (old U.S. 16 and Grand River through Lansing) was not opened through Clinton, Watertown and Eagle Townships until 1854.

Judge Samuel Dexter from New York State brought in pioneers to colonize the Dexter tract in Ionia County and they passed through DeWitt in May, 1833. They went westward from DeWitt village and traveled in a northwesterly direction through what is now Riley, Bengal and Dallas townships on to Lyons, is still called the Dexter Trail and may be taken from Pratt Road to Lyons if you would like to follow in the steps of early settlers of this area.

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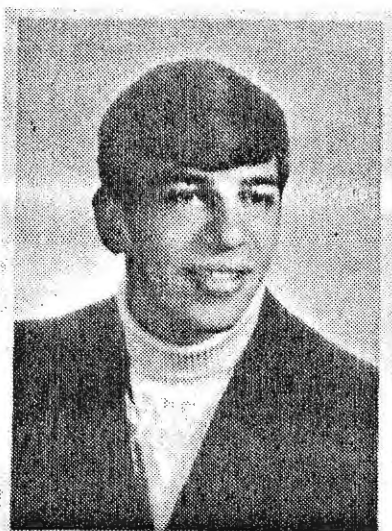

The next building at various times has housed Wood's Undertaking Parlor, a restaurant and bakery, U.S. Post Office, library and a beauty shop. It was torn down in 1968.

The next was Harry Moon's Grocery, it burned with the next two buildings in 1930. Next to Moon's is Smiley's Variety Store and Lietzke's Grocery. Across the corner is M. E. Towne's Grocery and Dry Goods Store, the building now houses the Shingle Shack.

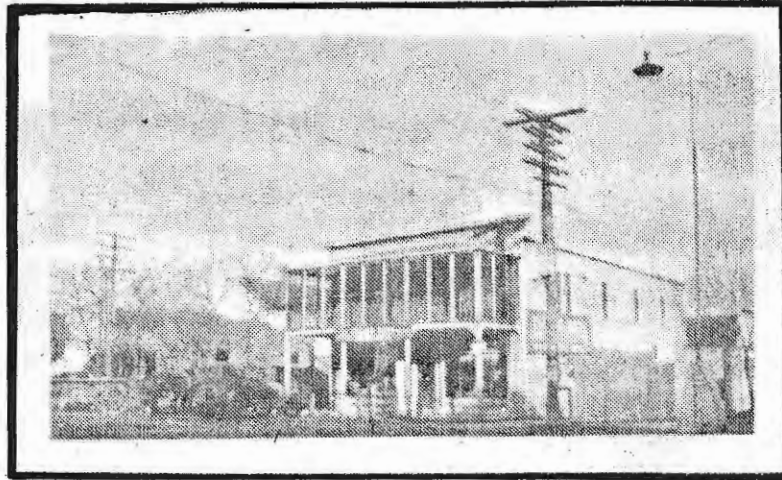

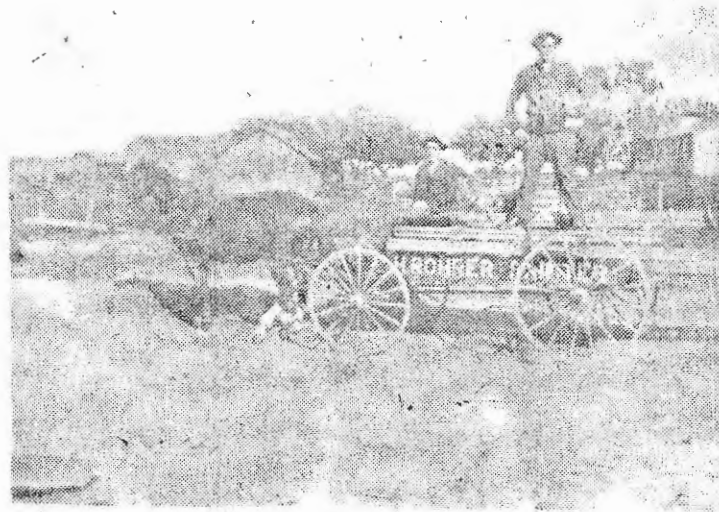

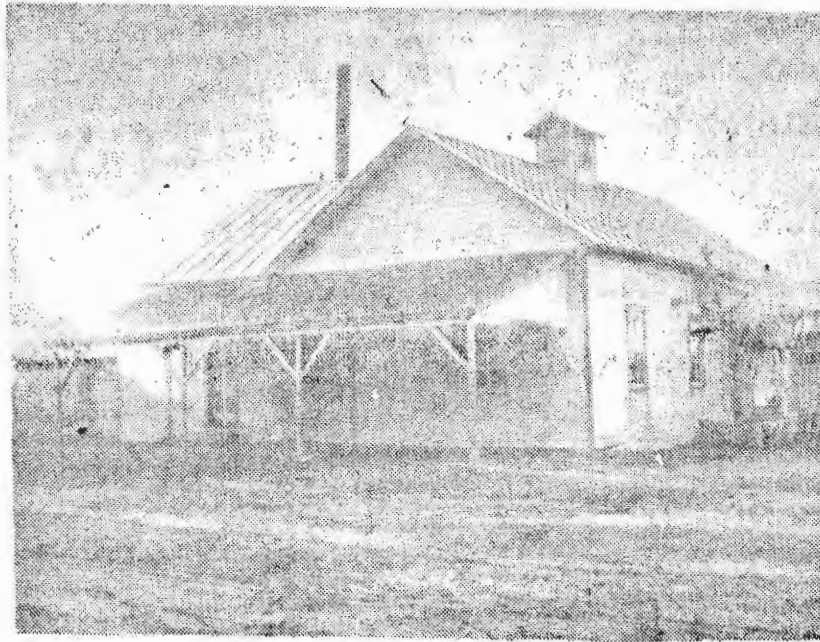

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THE OLD DEWITT MOTHER'S CLUB was organized in 1913. They worked with mothers and children and sometimes sewed for needy mothers; at one time they made an entire layette. They also sponsored an annual teacher's reception, the first one held at the home of Mrs. C. C. Woodruff. They also presented a framed picture to the High School.

They sponsored a circulating library which was in the home of Caroline Smith for two years. (This was the forerunner of the present DeWitt Public Library which was established in 1934 by this club which was then called the DeWitt Civic Club).

They joined the Federated Women's Club of Clinton County and entertained them at the old Methodist Church.

The club was discontinued in April, 1917, because of the war. Members voted unanimously to disband and become members of the DeWitt Red Cross. They turned their treasury of \$14.00 over to the Red Cross. They had one more formal meeting when they decided to sponsor a teacher's reception at the home of Mrs. McLouth.

Near spring of 1919 several members met at the home of Mrs. Viola Thompson to talk about reorganizing the Club. In two weeks they met at the home of Mrs. Grace Coon where they reorganized and elected officers. After much discussion it was decided to call this Club the DeWitt Women's Club. It was later called the DeWitt Civic Club and went out of existence during World War Two.

In 1934 Mrs. Mildred Carris, with the help of this club, established the DeWitt Public Library. It had many homes, the only one surviving is the Family Barber Shop, until Mrs. Gerda Rogerson gave the land that the library now stands on to be used for a Public Library.

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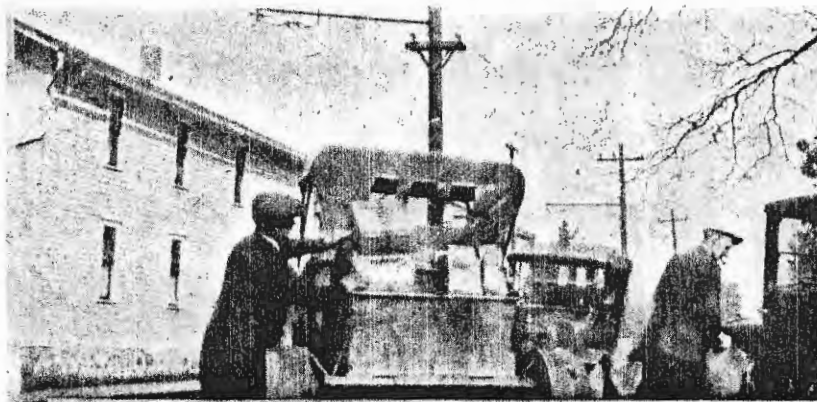

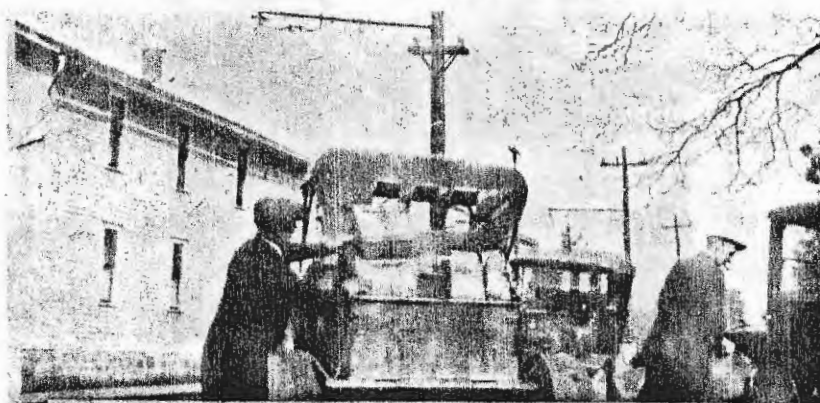

Rural mail carriers were Lew Drake, Charlie Reynolds, Carl VanFleet and Levi Sibley. They gathered each morning at the depot to load up their Model T trucks and cars to carry mail into the countryside around DeWitt, often the roads were almost impossible.

This Certifies, That Josie Holmes is a person
of good moral character, and has passed a satisfactory examination upon all the
branches required by law to entitle her to a **Third Grade Certificate**.
She is therefore deemed qualified to teach in School District No. 246
in this Township, for six months from this date, unless this Certificate shall be sooner revoked.

THIS IS A TEACHING CERTIFICATE issued to Miss Josie Holmes in January, 1881. Miss Holmes was in charge of intermediate education for DeWitt School from 1870 until the turn of the century. Can you imagine teachers of today standing still for a phrase in their contract reading "of good moral character"?

In 1880 the DeWitt School District (all of DeWitt Township) was divided into one fractional and five whole districts (DeWitt, Hurd, Lott, Gladden, Gunnisonville and the sixth district escapes me) with the following board of directors: Robert McConkey, James Hath, A. A. Woodruff, Christian Kraus, A. S. Weste and Edgar Hurd. The value of school property in DeWitt Township at that time was \$11,900, embracing one brick and five frame buildings. Three male and eleven female teachers were employed, 326 scholars resided within the township.

The certificate was given to the library by Helen Kraas, daughter of the late Merle Walker Burns, daughter of early DeWitt pioneers.
