

WHAT TO DO WITH THE EGGS AFTER THE EASTER BUNNY'S GONE

Baskets full of brightly colored eggs are one of Easter's oldest and most loved traditions. When the holiday is over, though, many people are left with the problem of what to do with so many hard-cooked eggs. Try some of the suggestions given here to make life after the holidays a bit more palatable.

Properly cooked and stored eggs will be the most appetizing. Hard boiled eggs must be kept refrigerated if you plan to eat them. If you don't want to completely dismantle your Easter baskets, leave one or two of your favorite decorated eggs and refrigerate the rest to be eaten and enjoyed by your family. Properly refrigerated hard boiled eggs can be safely used for seven days.

Once the holiday is over, hard-cooked eggs needn't be destined only to brown-bag lunches. They are much more versatile than most people imagine.

For starters, try making a quick egg sauce. Add two finely chopped eggs to a can of condensed cream of celery soup. Mix in two tablespoons chopped green pepper and, and, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup milk and season with pepper. Heat and serve over vegetables or ham croquettes.



1/4 cup milk and season with pepper. Heat and serve over vegetables or ham croquettes.

A quick and delicious side dish can be made by combining four hard-cooked eggs with a can of kidney beans. Mix with celery, parsley, chopped onion, and a few tablespoons of French dressing. Chill before serving.

Sliced eggs added to a basic cream sauce will add flavor to most vegetable dishes. Egg slices will brighten up many salads. Don't forget the old stand-by of egg salad as you plan uses for your Easter eggs. To give a new look and taste to the traditional egg and mayonnaise mixture, try adding 1/4 teaspoon of curry powder or mix in any of the following: chopped cooked meat (leftover ham or lamb from Easter dinner), pickle relish, chopped ripe or green olives, pimento, prepared mustard or sunflower seeds.

Use your imagination and you may wish you had colored more Easter eggs this year.

H.R.H. SEEKS VOLUNTEERS

Each year over thirty handicapped youth from Clinton County take riding lessons through a special program coordinated by the Cooperative Extension Service 4-H Youth Program and the Clinton Intermediate School.

H.R.H. is the acronym for Horseback Riding for Handicapped Youth. A primary goal of the Michigan 4-H HRH program is to provide a program therapeutic horseback riding, under the direction of a certified instructor, that is designed to improve balance, posture, coordination, confidence, self-esteem, and social growth of riders. The program also helps riders expand their general awareness of and interest in animal care by teaching them horse and stable management.

Riders have opportunities to learn and practice horseback riding skills, learn safety procedures, learn proper care, feeding and management procedures and learn to identify equipment and demonstrate it's proper fit, use and care. Youth participants also increase their ability to get along with others, demonstrate improved decision-making skills and improve their communication skills.

The program was piloted in Clinton County and since that time, 136 different youth and

to get along with others, demonstrate improved decision-making skills and improve their communication skills.

The program was piloted in Clinton County and since that time, 136 different youth and nearly 300 different volunteers have been involved in the program. Two week programs are held in the Spring, Summer and Fall.

Volunteers play an important role in the HRH program. The volunteers, who come from all walks of life, help the riders with a variety of tasks from putting on their safety helmets to preparing to mount.

During the riding lessons, volunteers serve as horse leaders or sidewalkers who help the riders maintain their balance in the saddle. As the rider's skills increase less volunteer assistance may be needed.

The next HRH session will be held May 2, 4, and 6th. The summer session will be held on June 20, 21, 22, 23, 27, 28, 29 and 30.
