TOWNSHIP BOARD NOTES

Firefighter EMT Pandora Ashley received special commendation at the March 26 meeting of DeWitt Charter Township board of trustees. A letter from Lansing Mercy Ambulance Service was read into the record, citing Ashley's "outstanding job" and coolness under pressure, when she assisted with CPR on a heart arrest patient during a short-handed rescue trip to the hospital February 13.

Trustee Robert Ancel gave the public safety committee's report, which gave recommendations for police and fire millage renewal. Supervisor Zeeb was authorized to seek information concerning property at US-27 and Clark roads. A request to rezone property on US-27 north of the Amoco Station from Business Shopping Center to Business Community was returned to the Planning Commission for further review.

Dennis Forsberg and Roger Dean, representing T.A. Forsberg Inc., made a presentation on privatization, a policy which uses private funds to build such public projects as sewer, water, roads, etc. for municipalities. Appointment of Douglas K. Riley to a half-time planning assistant position was approved.

The board accepted the 1989 audit prepared by Platte, Lemmen & Ireland, of Lansing. Jim Ireland answered questions and said that the township had been wise to raise sewer rates which improved cash flow. A smoking policy confining smoking to two designated areas in the township hall was approved. Board members set a special March 29 meeting date to discuss millage issues and personnel contracts.

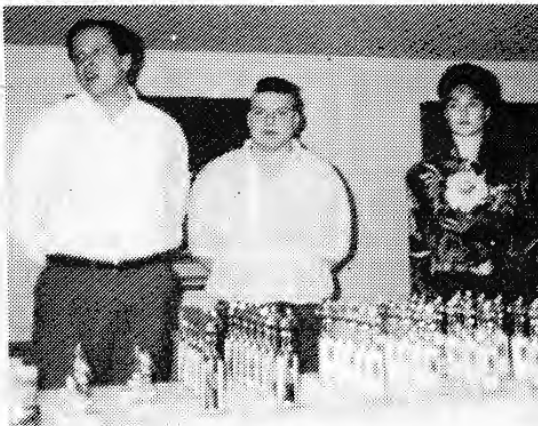
JUNE 4-H DAYS BECKON YOUTH TOWARD FUTURE

TOWNSHIP BOARD NOTES

Township board members held a special March 29 meeting to mull over millage proposals for presentation to voters in the August primary. They decided to prepare ballot language for three propositions, which will come back to the board again for final approval before they are placed on August ballots. Results of the recent survey, asking for citizens' input on township needs/priorities, figured heavily in the board decisions.

The separate propositions include: 1) Renewal of current operating millage, that is, the one mill levy for Fire Department operations and one mill levy for Police Department operations; 2) Levy of an additional 1/2 mill for 4 years, which shall include specific language concerning purchase of a high capacity water tanker, an emergency medical vehicle, communications equipment, and related equipment for police and fire; 3) Levy of an additional 1/2 mill for 4 years for local road improvements.

Trustees agreed to ask for the road fund millage, after discussing the fact that, while the county now matches township funds, projected federal cuts could mean that county revenue sharing for future road repairs might not be available later on. The police and fire millage request followed suggestions made by the township Public Safety Committee in its recent report.

Motions were also carried at the meeting to approve employment contracts with the superintendent and public safety director.

On March 12-15 the township Board of Review held 97 hearings, listening to appeals from property owners about their tax assessments.

About 25 puppies are being trained in Michigan at the present time and about four dogs have been placed in Michigan homes.

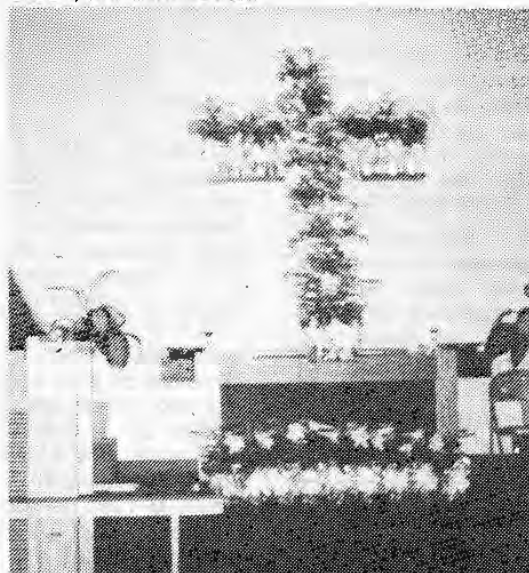

CITY COUNCIL NOTES

Council members voted to finance the Market and Washington Streets water extension from the city water fund at their April 2 regular council meeting. Council had voted down a special water district assessment to fund the project last month after input from residents who owned properties on the streets.

Any property owner, who elects to hook up to the water line at a later date, will pay the special assessment equivalent plus tap-in fee and meter costs per unit at that time. Mention was made that the time may come during future expansion when the city water fund will not be able to finance further projects and special assessments will then be required.

Other Action

Have you just finished your income taxes and are you wondering how much of all those records and papers you need to keep and what you can throw out?

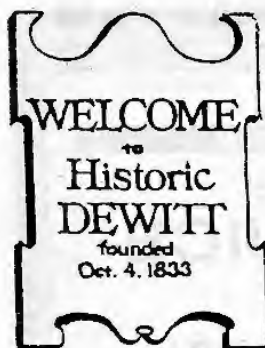
It's fairly safe to toss all cancelled checks made out to cash, the grocery store and to friends and relatives. You can throw away all cancelled checks more than six years old unless they were for a home improvement.

Unless your tax adviser suggests otherwise, you can toss supporting evidence for tax returns more than six years old. You can fill your trash can with all bank statements more than one year old, bills, receipts and warranties for items you no longer own. Pitch all bills and receipts for routine expenses such as utilities after six months unless you need them for tax purposes.

Finally, throw away all quarterly statements for which you now have an annual report and all material involving securities you no longer own, except transaction statements. Keeping unnecessary pieces of paper out of your files will make your records easier to use and maintain.

This Is Earth Week - Recycle and Precycle

The week of April 22 - Earth Week - marks the 20th anniversary of Earth Day. Michigan Recycle Week has officially been moved to that week to help celebrate the event. Earth Week is a time when we are asked to give some thought to how our behavior as consumers affects our planet. It's also a good time to begin recycling, if you're not already doing it.

If you're already recycling your glass containers, tin cans, plastic milk jugs and paper, that's great! But you can go one step further and **precycle**. Recycling is the physical act of dealing with items after you've bought them. Precycling, on the other hand, is the thoughtful purchase (or non-purchase) of items based on their packaging and their end disposability.

Precycling may be the easiest thing in the world to do. Simply by making the correct buying choices, we can prevent excess materials from getting into the waste stream. Here's how. 1. Select products carefully. Consider the environmental impact of each product you buy. What is the container made of? Can it be reused or even resealed? Is the product packaged in recyclable glass or metal? Is it offered in a recyclable container under a different brand name? If the packaging is excessive, do you really need it?

2. Overcome overpackaging. If the packaging isn't necessary to protect the product or it's designed just to catch your eye, buy a less packaged alternative. Avoid single-serving convenience packages. 3. Avoid disposables. Let the words "disposable" and "use it once" serve as signals not to buy the product. Avoid disposable cameras, razors, lighters, and plastic plates and cups. Buy reusable items, such as thermos jars, rechargeable batteries, cloth napkins and sponges. 4. Buy in bulk. Buying in bulk allows you to get exactly the amount you want, save money and avoid overpackaging.

5. Express yourself. Tell the store manager you don't want overpackaged items or items packaged in non-recyclable materials. Shop at stores that provide products packaged the way you want. If consumers quit buying a product, it won't be long before the wholesaler replaces that product with one that sells. Use the 800 numbers listed on some overpackaged products to tell the manufacturers you won't buy their products until the packages are recyclable. Also, be sure to let manufac-
