SOLDIER EARNS PURPLE HEART

U.S. Army Pvt. Mike Burgoyne, 20, a 1982 DeWitt High School graduate, received a Purple Heart last week from U.S. Army Gen. William Livsey, commander of U.S. forces in Korea.

Burgoyne was shot and wounded in the neck November 23, when a fire fight erupted between North Korean and United Nations troops along the Demilitarized Zone in the truce village of Panmunjom. A Soviet tourist defecting to South Korea set off the altercation, leaving three North Koreans and one South Korean soldiers dead.

The only American soldier wounded in the dispute, Burgoyne is the son of Eleanor Burgoyne, Waxwing Drive, and George Burgoyne of Portland. Mike joined the Army in March and was assigned overseas five months ago, after he had finished basic training and volunteered for duty in Korea.

LOCAL GROUP REALIZES DREAM

Parents built the cabinets, stove and sink and made puppets, members donated toys and raised money, and the first preschool met in rented quarters, the educational room of Hope Lutheran Church. This was the school's home for 10½ years, although cooperative families incorporated the preschool in 1976 and dreamed of getting their own building.

Burgoyne told UN officials that he was escorting a South Korean civilian work party at the DMZ when the fight began. His South Korean companion was killed in the resultant gunfire.

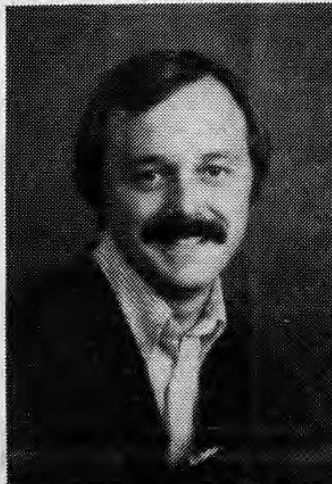

MACLD Names Sawyer 'Teacher of the Year'

Thomas Sawyer, DeWitt High School Resource Room Teacher for the past 13 years, has been named "Teacher of the Year" by the Michigan Association of Children with Learning Disabilities.

MACLD presented Sawyer with a plaque recently during their annual fall conference and awards luncheon at Fairlane Manor in Dearborn. The state nomination automatically puts the DeWitt teacher in line for national recognition when the National Association for Children and Adults with Learning Disabilities holds their annual meeting in San Francisco in February.

"I strive every day to implement into my teaching a realistic approach coupled with humor and compassion," is Sawyer's reaction to the honor.

And yet, even with all that, they study the scriptures on the subject, preach it from the pulpit, and discuss it in small groups. The Spirit of the bible really lives in the Woodsonville church!!

Following the service was a great feast of rice, cassava greens, palm oil, and hot peppers--it was delicious, as usual.

My big regret was...you couldn't be there to see how Christian love really unites hearts and minds around the world. "Then Peter began to speak, 'I now realize how true it is that God does not show favoritism but accepts men from every nation who fear him and do what is right.'" (Acts 10:34,35)

DeWitt school board at their December meeting approved Deborah Christensen's request to conduct a research project in the area of computer instructions. Christensen is a city council member and MSU graduate student. Her research project will involve interviews with 80 students in all four schools, grades 3, 6, 9 and 12.

DeWitt Township trustees appointed assessor Tom Woodruff as delegate to the Capital Area Regional Transportation System with Supervisor Frank Mann as alternate and voted not to rehire part-time parks and recreation director Diane Szewczyk for 1985.

Instead of retaining Szewczyk, the township will combine her position with that of senior citizens activities coordinator and advertise the position for 1,040 hours at \$6.25 per hour. Szewczyk has been working 20 hours weekly for DeWitt Township and dividing 20 hours a week between the City of DeWitt and Bath Township.

Board members approved \$1200 in body repair for the fire department's rescue vehicle, awarded a snowplowing bid for the township hall and fire hall to Patrick Thelen, and outlined plans to comply with federal handicapped regulations. They also decided that the first day to sign up for biannual Arts and Crafts sales will be reserved for DeWitt Township residents only.

In other action, trustees approved rezoning E. Coleman Road property from agricultural to light industrial for a landfill, gave a special use permit to Janet Lindgren, E. Clark Road, for a West Highland light terrier breeding kennel, and approved the preliminary plat of 34 plots for Looking Glass Pines on Herbison Road west to the sewage treatment plant.

MILLAGE NEEDS UNDER STUDY

School board members will hold a special meeting to address millage needs, after agreeing that additional future revenue must be generated to maintain the present program or major cuts must be made.

Discussion noted that the 1984/85 budget is a deficit budget since declining enrollment caused a reduction in projected income with no corresponding program reduction.

DeWitt School District is studying four major areas: facility needs, community education services, reading needs and early childhood education.

Two major rehabilitation projects are underway, roof repair and replacement of the gym floor in the Middle School. The district has a major goal of class size reduction in early elementary and English classes; computer education and soccer programs have been expanded and other programs added.

Currently operating millage is as follows:

County allocated (fixed)	8.0 mills
Extra voted in 1979 for 5 years	12.5 mills
Extra voted in 1980 for 5 years	11.5 mills
TOTAL OPERATIONAL	32.0 mills

The 12.5 extra voted mills have expired.

CITY COUNCIL NOTES

DeWitt will have taxi service, if Jean Lupnitz, who operates L&H Family Cab on U.S. 27, has her way. Lupnitz appeared before city council December 17, to announce plans for a radio-dispatched taxi service with which she hopes to cover St. Johns, DeWitt and DeWitt Township.

Carmen Seats suggested that the city attorney review St. Johns taxi ordinance and then recommend if DeWitt needs to enact a similar ordinance.

Roy Ketcheson, chairman of the city parks and recreation committee, asked council to consider increasing part-time recreation director Diane Szweczyk's position from 10 to 20 hours per week. Ketcheson listed many programs and activities Szweczyk had initiated since entering city employment, as well as programs in tennis and swimming that the additional hours would allow her to begin.

Council concurred with Ketcheson's statement, voting to double her work-time with the city. Since DeWitt township trustees had not renewed Szweczyk's contract for 20 hours

Upon recommendation from Carroll Ward, superintendent of public works, trustees accepted a \$1470 bid from Truck & Trailer Equipment, Inc. of Ithaca, for a new Select-O-Spread salt spreader. Ward said that the present tailgate sander purchased from that company had required no repairs in seven years, adding that it would be simpler for the DPW to have the same type for exchange on the trucks.

Council tentatively accepted Willis Cressman's snow removal bid of \$10 for each snow plowing of the city parking lot, directing Bob Peterson to check Cressman Excavating's auto liability coverage to ensure that it met the city bid specifications.

In other action a cabaret license was approved for Prairie Creek Golf Course which would allow bands to play for dancing at parties and weddings at the clubhouse.

Watertown Charter Township residents may choose from a number of activities offered this winter by the parks and recreation department. Winter programs include aerobics, babysitting (for young people who care for children), basketball, bowling, bingo, ice skating, shuffleboard, volleyball and cross country skiing.
