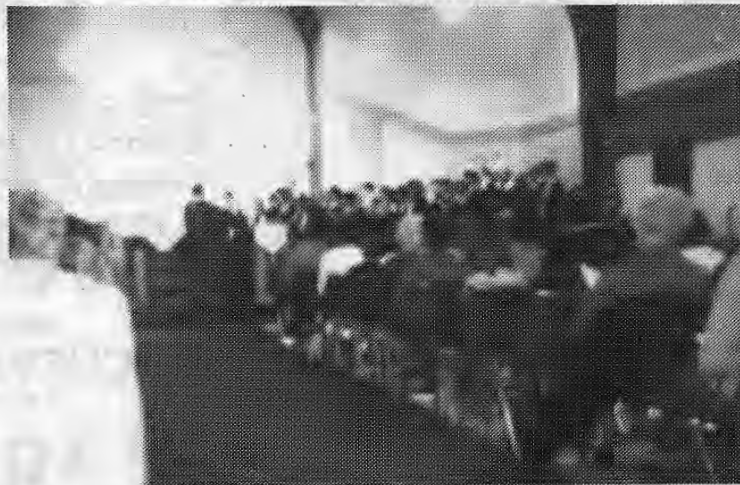

Ray Ludlum, of Michigan State Department of Mental Health, and Ken Slater, Community Mental Health representative for Clinton, Ingham and Eaton counties discussed the program, through which developmentally disabled persons are returning to community settings, and answered council questions.

Of the lots under study for the AIS (Alternative Intermediate Services) adult homes, two are located in the city, one on the east side of Schavey Road north of Waxwing and another at the Webb Road intersection with old DeWitt Road. The third location is in Watertown Township on

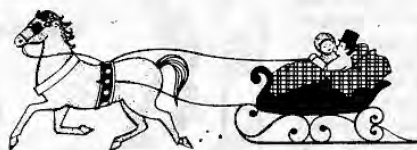

CITY COUNCIL NOTES

DeWitt's Downtown Development Authority received City Council's blessing Monday night with the first reading of the Tax Increment Finance & Development Plan Ordinance 101. Council was to meet Thursday for the second reading, after which the ordinance could be published. It becomes official upon publication.

Simply put, the new ordinance means that funds received through any increase in State Equalized Value for properties within the development district will now go to the Authority. Mayor Lynn Thayer assured the assembly that the ordinance does not increase taxes, but merely provides funding for the DDA when assessments go up.

Speaking for the DDA, Peg Guilford mentioned some of the possible downtown improvements in DeWitt's future - such things as improving the lighting, whether using gas lights or burying cables which are now overhead, opening a Farmer's Market, or attracting new businesses to the area. Sam Terranova, Chris Farmer, Lloyd Ballard and Dorothy Ely were other downtown business people who attended the public hearing on the ordinance preceding the regular council meeting. Bob Toland of Progressive Engineering, who helped to develop the comprehensive development plan, was also present.

Dale Abraham, representing the St. Johns firm of Biggs, Hausserman & Abraham, CPA, presented the city's 1984-85 fiscal year audit, explaining that city finances and accounting procedures were in good order, and then made a number of recommendations.

In other action, council accepted the \$1,418.04 low bid of West Shore Services, Allendale, for two Scott Air Pacs for the fire department. After hearing several telephone proposals and demonstrations, council decided to purchase a new Pro-Tel telephone system, when the city hall building expansion is completed.
