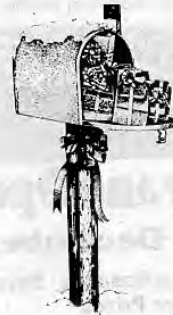

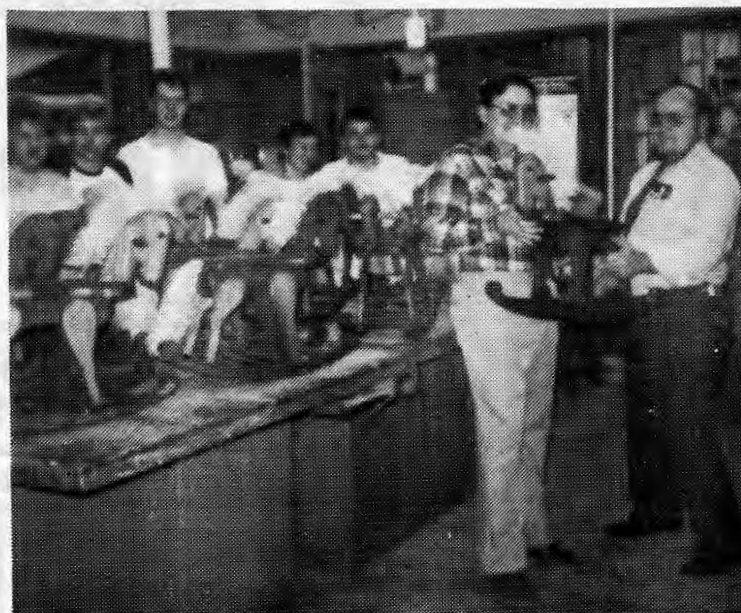

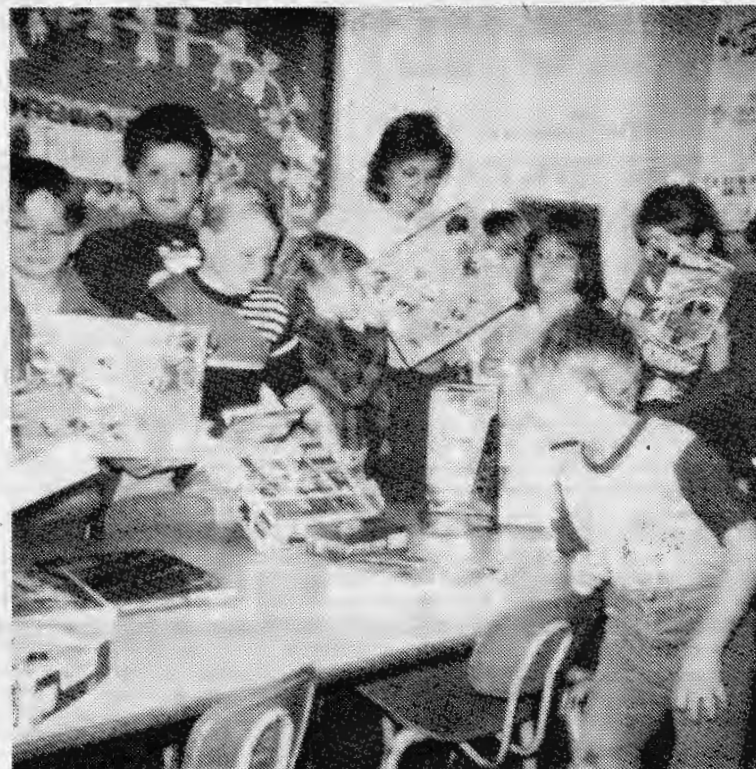


### Council Meets In DeWitt

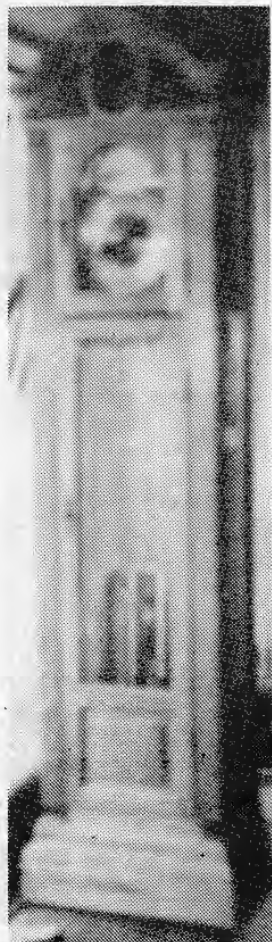

Much has been said in the news media regarding how literate are America's young adults. The answer depends on what standard you use to answer the question. If the standard of literacy is that of 100 years ago -- that is, the ability to sign one's name -- then virtually all our young adults are literate.

If the standard of the World War II era is applied, nearly 95 percent would meet or exceed the performance of 4th grade students. Applying the standard of the "War on Poverty" of 25 years ago, 80 percent meet or exceed the 8th grade level.

What about today's standards? The National Assessment of Educational Progress, with support

--about four out of five young Americans were unable to use a bus schedule properly

--approximately 60 percent could not follow directions to travel from one location to another using a map.

--twenty-eight percent were unable to write a letter to state an error had been made in a billing.

--and almost four percent could not write a few lines about a job that interests them.

## NO SMOKING IN PUBLIC LAW EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1

Smokers in Michigan will be prohibited from smoking in public places after January 1, 1987. A newly passed state law amends the Public Health Code, providing that an "individual shall not smoke in a public place or at a meeting of a public body, except in a designated smoking area."

The law defines a public place as an enclosed, indoor area used by the general public. It can either be owned or operated by a state or local governmental agency, or it can be privately owned but used by the general public. This latter category includes: educational facilities, auditoriums, arenas, theaters, concert halls, museums, health facilities, and any other facility when it is being used for a performance or exhibit of the arts.

Governmental facilities include the places of work for public employees and meeting places for public bodies [meeting rooms, public conveyances, auditoriums, educational facilities, etc.]

This new law would not apply to a private, enclosed room or office occupied exclusively by a smoker, or to a room or building used for a private function, if the space is under the control of the

sponsor of the function (e.g., a building rented for a wedding reception, etc.) This law also does not apply to federal buildings or employment.

Earlier laws that regulate smoking in hospitals, nursing homes, and restaurants are still in effect and are not changed by this newer legislation.

Under earlier laws, employers and proprietors of public places could ban smoking entirely. That is still possible under the new law. If smoking is allowed, then it must be restricted to designated smoking areas, and existing physical barriers and ventilation systems should be used to minimize the effect of the smoke.

This act will be enforced by state and local health departments. The civil fines for violation are: not more than \$100 for the first offense and not more than \$500 for subsequent violations.

a plant that has dark green foliage. Be sure the plant is well wrapped when you take it outdoors. Exposure to low temperatures, even for a short time, can cause leaves and bracts [the red, pink or white leaves] to turn brown and fall. Place your poinsettia near a sunny window or other well-lighted area, don't let any part of the plant touch cold window panes, and keep it out of warm and cold drafts from heaters and registers and doors and windows. For maximum blooming time, place the plant where daytime temperatures are between 60 and 70 degrees and move it to a cooler room at night [55 to 60 degrees is ideal].

Check the soil daily and water only when it is dry to the touch. Always water until water runs out the bottom of the pot. Apply a house plant fertilizer once a month according to the manufacturer's recommendations. For a well shaped plant next year, cut back the original stem to 4 to 6 inches in height, removing the old flower and one or two side branches. Do this in February or early March. Keep the plant in a sunny window at temperatures between 60 and 70 degrees and water and fertilize as needed.

When the danger of spring frost is past and night temperatures

are in the 40s, move the plant outside. Between July 15 and August 1, cut off the top portion of all shoots. These can be rooted in a mixture of half peat moss and half sand and flowered for next Christmas.

Take your poinsettia plant inside before the first frost [usually around Sept. 15 in lower Michigan]. Place it in a sunny window, as before. To induce it to flower, keep the plant in complete darkness between 5 p.m. and 8 a.m. daily from the end of September until color shows in the bracts [almost mid-December]. The temperatures should again remain between 60 and 70 degrees. This procedure should bring your poinsettia into flower by Christmas.
