

TOWNSHIP MINUTES

After a lengthy and sometimes heated discussion, DeWitt Charter Township approved the first reading of an ordinance to allow such businesses as barber and beauty shops to operate in homes. A second reading is required for passage of the ordinance.


The first reading of another ordinance, which would permit township businesses to use flashing signs was also passed. Exceptions to the rules will be any red and blue flashing signs which motorists might confuse with emergency vehicles.

Trustees discussed the question of assigning one patrol officer to the county investigative squad and referred it back to the Public Safety Committee.

"We will have to watch township dollars very closely this year," Treasurer Catherine Reed emphasized, "since we will have \$11,000 less state monies than last year."



COUNCIL APPROVES P&R MASTER PLAN

City council approval of the Parks and Recreation Committee's master site plan at Monday's meeting opened the way for P&R Director Marla Arney to apply for grant monies which would assist with local park improvements.

The comprehensive 80-page plan outlined just what additions may be slated for Riverside and McGuire Parks as well as smaller neighborhood parks, if grant money can be secured to help with the projects. Arney plans to apply to the Natural Resource Trust Fund, available this year, which might provide 75% aid with the city picking up the other 25%.

The plan cites Riverside park as "a key link in the beginning of a unique river oriented recreational corridor". A canoe and fishing dock on the west side of Bridge Street would enhance the area, as would renovation of the existing bike paths and pedestrian walkways on the east side.

Following the river theme, improvements to McGuire Park on West Main Street would include a picnic shelter, restroom facilities, ice rink and warming house, play apparatus and horseshoe courts. The existing Park and Recreation Building would be renovated to provide community room, warming house and restrooms.

A 1990 projection is Wilson Street Park, which would be a neighborhood park adjacent to Scott School and would provide recreation facilities catering to local neighborhood people including both children and elderly residents.

School Board Accepts Report

DeWitt Board of Education accepted the report of state-appointed fact-finder Russell E. Price at a special January 30 meeting, but non-teaching school employees expect to continue contract negotiations.

Recommendations of Price, who was appointed by the State Labor Board, favor the school district. Support personnel school employees would like more favorable provisions for part-time employees including bus drivers. While full-time employment begins at 2 1/2 hours a week, many members work only four or five hours daily.

The association had asked extension of medical benefits to 20-hour-a-week employees, which would cost about \$21,000 yearly. Price recommended the board's proposed 4.5 percent wage increase and not the 5.5 percent requested by the employees' association.

He refused to recommend two extra personal leave days or an

additional holiday for association members, instead suggesting that regular part-time employees receive pay for six holidays that occur during the part of the year they work.

DEWITT RESIDENT GOES TO LIBERIA

A DeWitt lass fulfilled a dream she'd had since high school, when she spent two months in an African mission compound this past fall.

Bobbi Ann Mull, who graduated from DeWitt High School in 1982, flew to Monrovia, Liberia September 30 under auspices of DeWitt Community Church and the Sudan Interior Missions (SIM). The attempted coup of the Liberian national government, which closed borders and airport, lengthened her stay to December 3.

Bobbi Ann, who had taken cosmetology through Clinton Intermediate School District's shared-time program during high school, is employed as a full-time cosmetologist at Meijer's Okemos store. She was able to utilize this experience, plus business management classes she has taken at Lansing Community College, while serving in the mission field.

After flying from New York, Bobbi Ann stopped in Holland to visit friends she had made on a previous trip to Europe in 1984, then arrived in Monrovia after brief stops at Casablanca and Freetown, Siera Leone. The ELWA (Eternal Love Winning Africa) compound at which she stayed is 12 miles from the capitol city of Monrovia.

The compound, Bobbi Ann explained, was composed of a business office, radio station, maintenance department, 45-bed hospital, and an American accredited academy for the mission children.

Traveling abroad for SIM as an SST (Special Short Term person, who fills a special need for a certain amount of time) Bobbie spent six weeks as a business office assistant and two weeks in the hospital accounting department. Her work included everything from computer input and file research to photo copying and typing.



COUNCIL REPORT

After hearing Austin Knapp's report on bids received for the proposed city hall expansion, council members asked for a written statement from the DeWitt Building Authority chairman, outlining the bids and pinpointing why they were so much higher than architects' estimates.

Bids received from six contractors at the January 22 bid opening ranged in price from \$442,400 to \$519,700. The DBA had hoped to handle the big remodeling project for \$275,000.

In other actions, council approved the Parks and Recreation master plan as presented and agreed to a basic assessing service contract with Manitron Corp. (formerly APTS) through June. A proposed contract with CAN-DO (Clinton Area New Development Organization) was tabled until it can be presented to the Downtown Development Authority.

An ordinance which concerns using weapons and hunting within the city limits, was not passed at the second reading, but sent back for revision.

She was surprised to find a large percentage of the missionaries to be Michiganders - among them, of course, the Edward Manring family of DeWitt.

ELWA village is about the size of one of our subdivisions, Bobbi said, with fairly modern buildings. Surrounding the compound are native homes, pole structures with mud walls and corrugated zinc roofs. Working alongside mission personnel in all areas are Liberian counterparts, who receive salaries as they learn the various jobs.

The setting is surprisingly picturesque, Ms. Mull remarked, since Liberia is situated on the West African coast. The compound apartment which she occupied faced the ocean. Papayas, bananas and coconuts grow on trees inside the compound and native children often sell fruit to make money. When Bobbi Ann arrived, the temperature was in the mid-80's and reached the mid-90's later in her stay as the dry season neared. Humidity usually was in the 90 - 95% range.

One Saturday Bobbi Ann accompanied some of the missionaries on a day trip to a native village, where the grass-roofed houses were more primitive than those near the compound. "We traveled by van 65 miles northeast," Bobbi said, "then into the jungle on a two-lane road, which became one lane; then we walked back through the rubber forest to reach the village in Bong County."

"We walked on logs across marshy areas... the vines hanging down reminded me of Tarzan movies."

"The SIM people had warned me not to leave my heart in Liberia," Bobbi reminisced, "but I think I left a piece of it there anyway."

"The Liberians have a saying 'Take time' that sums up their philosophy, she continued. "They always have time for a smile and 'take time' with you."

Liberian culture is interesting too, she said. "Their outward means of accomplishing a task may be different, but basically they're striving for the same goal we are." And the people in various situations "react much like their American counterparts...for instance, in the village everyone shunned the town drunk...and the college kids coming home felt they had outgrown their parents..."

Bobbi Ann is the only one of Ron and Marge Mull's three children who has traveled abroad for the missions. After serving in the U.S. Navy for 10 years, Mike Mull is stationed at Chesapeake, VA. He and his wife Tessie have three boys. Ginger Mull Holzhausen and her husband Jeff, an Army captain, took their two small children to Hanau, Germany last October to begin a three-year tour of duty.

Bobbi Ann says simply that her African experience "confirmed that Christ is in my heart always. You don't get a missionary attitude from going there, but from knowing Christ."



Cranmer, well-known in DeWitt as president of DeWitt Public Schools Foundation, is director of the YWCA Displaced Homemaker Program, which has recently been funded by a one-year grant from the Michigan Department of Labor.

Reporting that there are an estimated 80,000 to 90,000 displaced homemakers in Michigan, Cranmer explains that they are usually middle-aged or older women from various economic and cultural backgrounds who have lost their unpaid jobs as homemakers. Whether the cause is divorce, separation, death or disability of a spouse or loss of public assistance, they are women who have been pushed, suddenly and late in life, over the line into economic distress.

Cranmer, who has been informing community agencies about the new program, plans to work closely with existing agencies in Clinton, Eaton and Ingham counties in making referrals, so that persons needing assistance can gain maximum benefit from area programs.

Displaced homemakers, she says sympathetically, are persons caught in the middle- in the middle of family structures abruptly altered by divorce, death or disability - in the middle between the prime working years and retirement, yet lacking marketable skills for employment.

SCHOOL BOARD OKAYS TWO BIG PROJECTS

DeWitt Board of Education moved forward on two major projects at last Monday's meeting, voting to improve the school district's elementary facilities and implement a community education program.

The board agreed to choose an architect and financial consultant to again review facility needs and develop a proposal to submit to the public. While a facilities needs committee had rejected the idea of building a new elementary school, suggestions were made to add a gym and remodel Scott School cafeteria and make other improvements on all school buildings.

Public meetings were held in December and January to solicit input from local citizens. Turnout at the meetings was light, but there appeared to be a strong consensus to improve elementary facilities.

Following the May 1985 recommendation to the Community Education Task Force, board members moved Monday night to initiate a community education program by filling the position of director of community education.

Superintendent Steve Garrett hopes to have the new administrator start work on the program in April so that community education classes can be offered for 1986-87. Recommended salary range for the new director would be in the \$28,000 to \$34,000 bracket based on qualifications and experience.

CITY COUNCIL NOTES

Discussion of ways to trim costs of the proposed city hall building project occupied a large portion of Monday evening's city council meeting. DeWitt Building Authority chairman Austin Knapp and architect Robert Freeman of Freeman, Smith & Associates outlined some cost-cutting possibilities.

A few of the options, Knapp said, include eliminating the basement which was to provide badly needed storage space, going to a flat roof which is not as attractive aesthetically and changing to forced air heating system.

Since council reaffirmed its intention of staying within the earliest price estimate (\$275,000) at the Monday meeting, the DBA and architect will try to achieve both goals - staying within the financial parameters and acquiring the space needed by city hall and police staff.

Knapp expects to call a special meeting of the authority this week. Members, in addition to Knapp, are Dan Bourbon, Rudy Borr and Henry Theroux. Fifth member Doug Twiss resigned when he became fire chief.

In other action, council members reviewed the water agreement with DeWitt Township and made some recommendations. Administrative aide Bob Peterson, city engineer Orla McGuire and Wayne Verspoor, liaison person from the Sewer and Water Committee, will now go over the contract with township delegates.

Council had voted last month to hook into the DeWitt Township water system and utilize the township's water storage tank near the middle school.




Navy Petty Officer 1st Class Daniel J. Tierney recently reported for duty at Naval Air Station Chase Field, Beeville, TX.
