CITY COUNCIL NOTES

City officials are hoping for good attendance in order to get citizen input at the town meeting to be held at 7:30 p.m. in DeWitt Middle School tonight - Monday, January 13.

Engineer Paul Thompson has been making arrangements for the town meeting which will cover the much-debated topic of city water storage systems. The various options offered will be discussed and residents will have a chance to ask questions.

Council members at Monday's regular meeting agreed to have Manitron Assessing Services of Okemos (formerly APTS) handle assessor work for the remainder of the fiscal year. They approved an amendment to the construction engineering pact on the DeWitt Road/Bridge Street project, which will increase the cost slightly but be under budget.

Austin Knapp told council that bid requests had gone out for the city hall expansion project. Bids will be opened, Knapp said, at 7:15 p.m. Wednesday, January 22, during the DeWitt Building Authority's regular monthly meeting at city hall.

With little or no art background but a definite proficiency in sewing, Myrna Yabs has become a most respectable tole painter in the seven or eight years since she first ventured into the field.

"I took four tole painting classes from Jean Blizzard," Myrna recalls, and that launched her into the hobby.

Myrna pointed out that tole painting began on tinware, but artists have transferred it to other media including wood and fabric. Although her walls boast a number of paintings done on circular saw blades, she prefers working with wood. She especially likes "to do teeny things...teeny art with tiny faces."

"I begin by purchasing a large quantity of wood," she explains, "and then just cut one pattern for about two weeks. Then I use that particular design to work on until all that wood is gone." The sample she showed us was a plaque, possibly 12" x 18", which is a nice size to work with.

Workbooks and patterns are stored in Myrna's basement workroom, adjacent to the round table which holds her paints and craft materials. Tracing the design she selects on paper comes first, the DeWitt artist points out, then tracing it onto wood and cutting it out with the bandsaw. Sanding the wood is her next order of business, followed by staining or painting - and then she is finally ready to begin her tole painting.

The entire Yabs residence reflects Myrna's creativity and versatile painting. Still on view from the Christmas season is a small nativity set, the wooden background highlighted with tinpunching to add a metallic touch. An angel hovers above the small delicately painted figures of Jesus, Mary and Joseph.

The Bethlehem scene sits atop a handsome old dry sink...and of course, the sink's two wooden doors have tole designs. A small tilt-table bears a Yabs-painted utilitarian checkerboard on its surface, and a quilt rack has tole designs on either side.

An attractive grouping of Myrna's tole pieces grace the wall above Yabs' large kitchen table; jelly cupboards, one in the kitchen and one downstairs, have been touched by her deft tole paintbrush.

Wood is her favorite medium, Myrna insists. A Betsy Ross tole painted on black background flanks the downstairs Buck stove. White daisies

prefers sewing her own clothes to selecting them in stores, but tole painting takes a good deal of her time. She was a member of Historic DeWitt Arts and Crafts Council while it was an active organization, and now belongs to the Kansas-based National Society of Tole and Decorative Painters.

When the kids are older, Myrna expects that she will be able to devote more time to such organizations. Right now, she and her husband Ed, a dye-maker and car-builder, find themselves engrossed in the activities of their offspring - Ethan, 17, a junior at DeWitt High School, and Rachel, 14, a DHS freshman.

The Yabs family also embraces a dog, two cats and an "attack rabbit which scratches on your leg if you don't play with it." In addition, they have two horses, conveniently stabled down the road at Four Seasons Farms, which Myrna and Rachel ride.

The Lansing-born family has resided in DeWitt for 11 years.

BIDS HIGH: There were not a lot of happy faces in council chambers last Wednesday night, when bids were opened for the planned city hall expansion.

The six contractors' bids, which came in before deadline, were not in the DeWitt Building Authority's \$275,000 ball park at all. Bids were as follows: M. Davis Construction \$463,000; Design & Build, Inc. \$512,000; Hanel-Vance Construction, \$519,700; Hull Construction, \$449,944; K & D Construction, \$442,400, and Moore-Troper Construction, \$465,000.

Austin Knapp, Authority Chairman, remarked "We're not back to square one, but we certainly didn't pass Go." The architects will now check with the lowest bidders to explore why bids were so unexpectedly high, Knapp said.

Freeman-Smith & Associates of Lansing had prepared the final drawings for the remodeling, which would increase city hall space from the present 2,400 square feet to 5,200 square feet.

CITY COUNCIL NOTES

The prolonged debate over which direction to take with the city water system came to a conclusion Tuesday night, when council decided to hook into the DeWitt Township water system, thereby utilizing the township's water storage tank. Instead of building a new water tower downtown, the city now plans to build 10,300 feet of water mains at an approximate cost of \$494,100.

Council members scheduled a work session Monday night, January 27, to go over the proposed water contract with DeWitt Township.

Several citizens at the meeting Tuesday voiced concern about unanswered questions regarding two homes to be built in the city under mental health auspices for developmentally disabled adults. Delegates for the Michigan State Department of Mental Health and Community Mental Health for the tri-county area had attended the December 2 council meeting to explain the project.

Council asked Administrative Aide Bob Peterson to set up a public meeting on the topic. The meeting has been set for Wednesday, February 5 at 7 p.m. in the Middle School cafeteria. Mt. Pleasant regional representatives will be on hand to answer citizens' questions at that time.

City locations for the proposed homes are on Schavey Road north of Waxwing and at Webb Road and old DeWitt Road. A third home is to be built in Watertown Township on Airport Road north of Clark Road.

In other action, council requested a mayor's report on extending the sewer line on E. Main St. east of city hall, and city employees were asked to chose either their traditional Blue Cross Blue Shield medical insurance or Physicians Health Plan by January 31.


