
FOUNDATION CONSIDERS MINI-GRANTS

CITY COUNCIL NOTES

Council members authorized engineer Paul Thompson to do a study within the next 60 days with an aim to solving the downtown area's water problems. The \$1,300 fee for the study will be paid from interest in the sewer and water budget. Mayor Lynn Thayer is to give a July 1 recommendation on the best way to solve the issue.

Thompson can suggest, as an answer to the state health department's concern about city water, either installation of an elevated water tower north or south of the river downtown, or connecting to DeWitt Township's water system, which is served by the water tank near the middle school and running the pipes through high school property or along East Geneva.

Regarding proposed city hall alterations costs, DeWitt Building Authority Chairman Austin Knapp suggested the use of non-masonry construction instead of brick on the above-ground portion to save money. He said that the basement could also be left unfinished and some landscaping deferred to keep costs within the planned \$295,000 budget limit.

In other business, council approved a \$609 bid from Boichot Concrete for 14 yards of cement to control erosion on the wooden terraces at Riverside Park, as well as approving purchases of an electronic typewriter for the city clerk's office and new radio equipment for the fire department.

DeWitt Charter Township board has announced a Tuesday, July 23, election.

Voters will be asked to approve a one mill levy for three years to purchase fire department vehicles and equipment. Approval of the millage will allow the township fire department to buy two new pumper fire trucks and mini-pumper rescue vehicle. Numerous mechanical problems have plagued the two fire trucks which need replacement.

Township residents would pay \$1.00 per thousand of state equalized value per year, if the millage passes.

COUNCIL GIVES NOD TO WATER PROPOSAL

Mayor Lynn Thayer named department heads for the 1985-86 year and DeWitt city council agreed to a new "hybrid" water proposal for downtown DeWitt at the July 1 regular meeting.

Mayoral appointments include Clerk/Treasurer, Margie Lotre; Police Chief, Wendell Myers; City Attorney, Dan Matson; DPW Superintendent, Carroll Ward; Cemetery Sexton, Floyd Fowler; City Engineer/Building Inspector, Orla McGuire; Street Commissioner, Lynn Thayer; Administrative Assistant, Robert Peterson, and City Assessor Gail Watkins. First Assistant Chief Louis Nabbeleld was named Acting Fire Chief for a 3-month period to September 30, 1985.

Taking portions of the original Scott Street/Main Street and Jefferson/Bridge Street water plans, City Engineer Orla McGuire, Administrative Aide Bob Peterson and Consulting Engineer Paul Thompson recommended a new and more economical route. Easements from several property owners would still "do the job at less cost", providing an 8" water main looping around the business district, Peterson told council.

Total estimated cost for the project would be \$11,115 with some \$3,000 city costs and remainder raised by special assessments on the eight affected lots and land parcels. Approving the plan, council members directed the city assessor to draw up a special assessment roll, with assessments spread over three years at 9 1/2% interest. Public hearing on the water improvement assessments may be held as early as the August 5 council meeting.

School Board Okays Plan for Kindergarten

DeWitt Board of Education elected officers for the coming year and approved a Developmental Kindergarten program at their July 1 meeting.

Thomas Kamppinen and Dave Harfst continue as board president and vice president respectively; Carol Haag is secretary and William Schaar, treasurer. Board meetings will be held on the second Monday of the month at the Griswold Building, with a time change from 7:30 to 7 p.m. for an earlier start.

After discussion, board members agreed to restructuring of DeWitt School District's kindergarten program to provide for a Developmental Kindergarten starting this fall. At the recommendation of Debbie Hancock, high school health and P.E. teacher, and Robert Elliott, elementary health and P.E. teacher, the board also approved a scoliosis testing program. As a result, P.E. teachers will screen pupils in grades 5 - 9 in fall and spring for scoliosis (curvature of the spine).

Certified staff lay-offs, due to projected decline in enrollment, increased operating costs and projected level of funding, were approved. To be placed on lay-off status are William Abbey, high school auto shop teacher; Marla Miller, part-time special education; Michelle Willson, elementary staff; Barbara Hanes, elementary staff, to half-time status. It was noted that some of these programs may be restored if the August millage passes.

Noting that this may be the last year for Federal Revenue Sharing, (DeWitt anticipates \$37,140) the mayor recommended allocating \$16,061 to local street programs, \$16,062 to the water fund, \$250 to miscellaneous, and \$12,000 transferred to General Fund for furniture for the new city hall quarters. The total of \$44,373 would make use of a \$6,733 balance from last year. Council approved the proposed budget, which had been available for public inspection since June 18, without any citizen comment.

No suggestions have been turned in so far regarding the new name for the completed DeWitt Road/Bridge Street, Clerk Margie Lotre reported. Norm Farnum of S. DeWitt Road spoke out against any name changing - unless naming only the newly added section of road - since it would cause considerable expense for business people who would have to purchase new stationery/business cards/etc. with changes of address. DDA Director Austin Knapp suggested naming the new section "DeWitt Bridge Drive."

In other action, council voted to set a 13.25 total millage rate for the 1985-86 fiscal year and gave final plat approval to Chateau Shores #2. Richard Beckwith, E. Webb Road, called council attention to the fact that street construction work had left his driveway with a decided drop and asked for necessary repairs.

Effective July 1, City Ordinance 82 affecting weed growth higher than 12" will raise the fee for lot mowing from \$25 to \$50.

When the swim program ends in early August, it's time to close and drain the pool (no small job!), then have the tiles checked and regROUTed. Before you know it, early practice begins for football and other fall sports.

Head Custodian Albert Schulz finds summer-time little different from the rest of the year. He and his staff clean and seal classrooms with tile floors, wash desks, clean heating system filters, shampoo carpets, re-seal gym floors and hallways.

Painting and general repairs such as door hinges, cleaning lighting fixtures and replacing light bulbs throughout the building are part of the summer program. Cleaning out all the lockers and then changing the lock combinations for the incoming students is a lengthy and tedious chore.

Schulz, Dennis Angell, Leroy Ward and Frieda Felzke compose the custodial staff. Jack Thompson divides his time between high school and middle school during the school year and works full-time at the middle school during the summer. Bruce Dalman handles maintenance for all of the school buildings.







Woman Has Rare Surgery

Coleman, who suffered severe leg injuries last September when a car smashed into the rear of her 1977 Plymouth on North Logan Street in Lansing, has been in a wheelchair ever since. In April she visited Dr. Allan Gross in Toronto and was put on the list of persons awaiting donors.


The 5½ hour surgery, performed at Mount Sinai Hospital by a team of six orthopedic surgeons, simultaneously transplanted bones in her knee, one of her entire tibia and half of the other tibia.
