



## From The Mayor's Desk Road Construction Set For August

DeWitt Mayor Lynn Thayer reports that construction on the DeWitt Road-Bridge Street improvements project will probably begin in August. He said it will be a 90 day project, 75 percent of which is federally funded. Cost is estimated at about \$600,000, said Thayer. When completed Bridge Street will connect with DeWitt Road and then to a entrance to I-496.

The city first applied for federal funds in 1979. Delay in the project was because of the federal stipulation that did not allow angle parking. Thayer said the city felt angle parking was more advantageous in that it allowed for more parking spaces and was easier and more convenient for drivers to park. According to Thayer, the city did a parking study, an accident study and a traffic count. He said the traffic count was quite high but that the studies showed that angle parking was no more hazardous than parallel parking. Bridge Street is 99 feet wide, he said and was thus wide enough to allow cars to back safely out onto the road.

With help from U.S. 10th District Congressman Don Albosta, a waiver was obtained, allowing DeWitt to keep angle parking, and opening the way for construction to begin. Thayer credited local store owner Peg Guilford with getting the parking problem to Albosta's



## Pastor Eastman Leaves DeWitt Takes New Post In Kalkaska

Rev. Murl Eastman, having served as pastor of the DeWitt Community Church for the past 14 years, is leaving next week to begin a new pastorate at The People's Church in Kalkaska. He and his wife Virginia came to DeWitt from Mason where he was pastor of the First Baptist Church.

"It's been a pleasant 14 years," said Rev. Eastman. "It was a difficult decision to leave here. The people have become like family. I have never lived in a nicer community and will miss the people."

Although the Eastmans have enjoyed DeWitt, Virginia said that they "really felt this was God's calling" and that "it was time for one more challenge."

Rev. Eastman's pastoral duties extended beyond the DeWitt Church and the 200 member congregation. He has also been jail chaplain for Clinton County for 14 years. Previously, he served as jail chaplain for Ingham County for 16 years.

In addition, he has been an active civic citizen. On August 24, 1973, he was sworn in as mayor of DeWitt; he was then elected to a full term, serving until Nov. 1976. According to the DeWitt City Clerk's office, Eastman served as a parttime police officer with the city police department from Dec. 1970 until his recent resignation.

## DEWITT OX ROAST

The 38th Annual DeWitt Ox Roast, sponsored by the Memorial Association, is set for August 18. Chairpersons Lee and Linda Hodges report that this year's event, held on the streets of downtown DeWitt, will again serve the cafeteria-style beef sandwich meal with all the trimmings.

In addition to the food, other attractions include a bingo tent, a beer tent, an arts and crafts fair in Riverside Park, carnival rides and a frog leaping contest. The petting zoo will be back with pony rides added this year. According to Linda Hodges, the events annually attracts 10,000 to 20,000 people. She said there were rumors of a Las Vegas-Style Night, but plans for this were not final. A cooperative babysitting service will be available for parents who want to the arts and crafts without their small children. Babysitters will even paint clown faces on the youngsters.

The Parade, which last year had 68 units, will leave Milbrook Meadow at 10:00 am., march to the downtown area and then back to Milbrook Meadows.

Proceeds from the festivities go toward the upkeep of the Memorial Building, a city facility which houses a library, banquet rooms and meeting rooms. Civic organizations can use the building free in exchange for helping with the Ox Roast, said Linda.

He also pointed out that many DeWitt residents work in Lansing and it was only a five mile drive to downtown Lansing.

## Special Meetings Slated

The DeWitt Board of Education will be holding two special meetings in the next few days. Tonight's meeting at 7:30 pm. in the Administration Building is for the adoption of an appropriations budget for the 1984-85 year. This budget would be a tentative one since the Michigan legislature has not yet passed any state aid for the upcoming school year, and according to the superintendent's office, teacher contract negotiations are still going on.

State law requires that a budget be drafted by July 1, said Debbie Johnson of the DeWitt Superintendent's Office. The special meeting was called because the budget was not ready for the regular monthly board meeting. The Board waited as long as possible before submitting the budget to see what the legislature would do in regard to state aid.

Another special meeting is scheduled for July 2, 7:30 pm. in the Administration Building. At that time board officers for the 1984-85 school year will be elected. New board members elected this month are Glenn Tarrant and James Osborne.
