Since twenty-two teams sent their fastest swimmers to the meet at Alma high School, earning high point trophies was a special honor for DeWitt swimmers and their coaches, Todd Briggs and Lynnie Decker.

Swimming on the 8 & Under team were 7 year-olds Kelly Cowan, and Katie Peacock of DeWitt; Lisa Mosley of Bath and Jill Nieman of Eagle. The 8-year-olds included Dana Baisley, Jenny Christensen, Caroline Leknius and Ann McCrackin of DeWitt.

Points were accumulated as follows: 3rd place, 100-yd. medley relay; 5th place, 100-yd. free style relay and 7th place, 100-yd medley relay.

Individual results: Baisley, fourth place, 25-yd backstroke; Christensen, seventh, 50-yd free style, 11th in both 25-yd free style and 25 yd butterfly; Nieman, third place, 25-yd free style and 50-yd free style, fourth in 25-yd butterfly.


SATURN SITE HERE?

YOUNG SWIMMER IS HIGH ACHIEVER

Jenny Brown, a fourth grader at Fuerstenau School, is one of many outstanding members of the DeWitt Swim Club. She began her swimming career with the Club at the age of five. At that time she could barely swim a length of the pool but still wanted to be part of the team. By swimming regularly and practicing hard Jenny improved quickly. Recently, she easily swam 200 lengths (within a two-hour period) during a team fund-raiser.

Jenny swims all competitive strokes (freestyle, backstroke, butterfly and breaststroke) but her favorite is the breaststroke. In 1984, she won 1st place in the 25 yard breaststroke in the 8 & Under classification at the Michigan Team Swim League Championship meet at Alma.

This Year Jenny qualified to swim in the 10 & Under classification in the United States Swimming Girls Championship meet March 8-10 in Livonia. With 402 swimmers competing from across the state, Jenny finished 13th in 100 yard breast stroke with a time of 1:31.75, which was 1 second faster than her best time. She was 15th in the 50 yard breast stroke with a time of :42.26.

One of the nicest surprises Jenny has had as a swimmer was last summer when she received her first issue of Swimmers World Magazine (an international publication). She opened it to look for the results of the League Meet in March of 1984 and found a picture of herself and several teammates heading up the midwestern section, along with the results which featured her name in three events.



AG NAME CHANGE REFLECTS DIVERSITY

Farmers' Week and Natural Resource Days at Michigan State University, March 18-23, has been renamed Agriculture and Natural Resource Week.

The change, says Tom Thorburn, ANR Week coordinator, better reflects the increasing diversity of the educational programs being offered during what has become one of MSU's major winter outreaches to state residents.

"This move is in keeping with the evolution of the 70-year-old event, which began as a series of institutes that trained farm leaders in seminars held in 67 counties," Thorburn says.



"ANR Week will allow us to continue to provide the kind of educational programs that will most benefit the state's agriculture and natural resource base," Thorburn says.

This program expansion is not coming at the expense of the more traditional agricultural programs.

"Like those who participated in the seminars held in counties during the 1800s, farmers can still learn about new livestock and crop production practices," Thorburn says. "That's the policy of ANR Week -- it maintains its roots while reaching new audiences in the best of the land-grant tradition."





GROUPS SUPPORT MILLAGE ELECTION

The Citizens for School Millage Committee has embarked on a series of informal coffees and meetings in the school district, in an effort to get out a strong "Yes" vote for the two DeWitt millage proposals. Election day will be Monday, April 22, at Fuerstenau Elementary School. The last day for voter registration is today, March 25.

Proposal I on the ballot will be a millage renewal proposition. It combines renewal of the 12.5 mills that expired in December 1984 and renewal of the 11.5 mills which will expire in December 1985. The total renewal millage of 24 mills would be effective through 1990.

Proposal II, an additional millage proposition, requests three additional mills for three years. This would increase the voted millage for operation from 24 to 27 mills.

The millage committee, composed of DeWitt citizens and Board of Education members, has studied present and future needs of the school district. Their conclusion was that the renewal is necessary plus the three additional mills, in order to enable the school district to provide a continuing quality educational program.

Purpose of the millage is to maintain current operational levels, provide a quality instructional program in DeWitt Public Schools, provide up to date equipment and maintain necessary facilities for effective instruction and services.

Failure of the millage to pass would mean that reductions must be made in some of these areas: instructional staff, support staff, athletic programs, transportation, equipment, textbooks and supplies.

POLICE BACK TO 5 DAYS

Beginning April 1, police in DeWitt Township will return to five-day weekly eight-hour shifts instead of four-day weeks and 10 hour shifts they have been on for the last 17 months.

Both shifts have advantages, according to Police Chief Carroll Lee and Thomas Woodruff, township services coordinator. Officials estimate that the 17-month experiment may have cost the township about \$4,000 over budget in police overtime.
