"A nice variety of dresses was available last year, and the young ladies who found a "new" dress were so pleased -- as were their parents! Also, inviting a select number of other schools to participate ensures that there will be a wide variety of dresses available," according to Mrs. Williams. The following schools have been invited to bring in dresses: St. Johns, Pewamo-Westphalia, Ovid-Elsie, Fowler, Laingsburg, and Bath. This event is limited to these schools because of limited space.

Mrs. Williams hopes that more girls will overcome the feeling that they must only wear a brand-new dress. Many girls want to sell their dresses, but not as many are willing to look for a used dress. "No one really knows or cares whether a dress is new or used, and having dresses from other schools ensures that no one would remember a particular dress," said Williams. Generally, the gowns are priced around \$30-\$50, which is worth it to the seller who otherwise would still have it hanging in a closet.

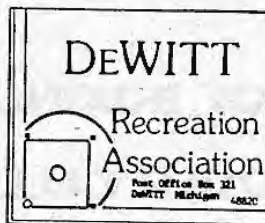
As a former native of DeWitt, Green is very excited about the new office. She would be happy to put on a presentation for DeWitt organizations and civic clubs.

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EASTER BRINGS QUESTIONS ON EGG STORAGE AND SAFETY

Along with spring comes Easter and all of the festivities and decorations associated with the holiday. Beautifully decorated eggs are one popular custom enjoyed by many different ethnic groups. Some customs call for draining the egg from the shell and decorating the empty shell. Another way is to hard-cook the eggs first and then decorate the shells.

If you decorate hard cooked eggs, you need to follow a few simple rules so that your product will be cooked and stored properly and can be safely eaten.

Keep it clean!

Before cooking the eggs, wash your hands. Make sure your countertops and cooking utensils are clean. Handle the eggs, raw or cooked, as little as possible to prevent contamination through the shell.

Cook it right!

Put the raw eggs in a pot of cold water. Heat the eggs over medium heat until the water reaches a boil.

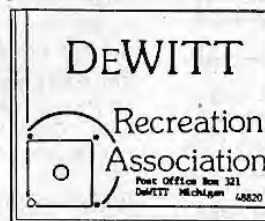

clean. Handle the eggs, raw or cooked, as little as possible to prevent contamination through the shell. Cook it right!

Put the raw eggs in a pot of cold water. Heat the eggs over medium heat until the water boils. Immediately reduce the heat to keep the water simmering and simmer for 20 minutes. Never boil the eggs.

Air-cool the eggs in their shells in an open container in the refrigerator. Water cooling is not recommended because of the possibility that germs in the water could penetrate the eggshells.

Decorate according to custom

After the eggs are cooked and cooled, you can decorate them with pure food coloring or dyes formulated with food grade colorants.

Store carefully

Store the eggs according to the following guidelines:

--Non-decorated hard-cooked eggs should be stored in the refrigerator immediately after cooking and consumed within 7 days. Do not eat them if they were left out of the refrigerator for more than two hours.

--Decorated hard-cooked eggs should be store in the refrigerator before decorating, after decorating and after the East egg hunt. Decorated eggs should be eaten within two or three days and only if they were out of the refrigerator a total of two hours or less for coloring, hunting and displaying.

--Discard any cracked hard-cooked eggs.

--If the two-hour limit is a problem, you may want to color two sets of eggs -- one for eating and one for displaying. Be sure to label each set clearly.

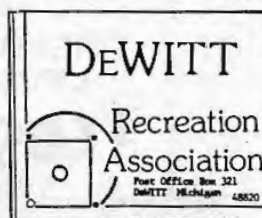

Alar is a growth regulator that enables growers to provide consumers with top-quality moderately priced apples. Alar is used by apple growers in Michigan to maintain firmness and resist bruising, early decay and cracking in the fruit. Alar helps ensure optimal crop yield by preventing fruit from dropping to the ground prior to harvest.

Dave Starr, of the Chicao EPA Office has shared this information with the Michigan Extension Service.

1) Unirayal, the company that produces the Alar, is on track in conducting the required tests and submitting reports for reregistration.

2) At the maximum feeding rate in the mouse study, increased levels of blood vessel tumors occurred. This did not happen in the rat feeding study. The rate of feeding in the mouse study that caused the elevated tumor rate was 10,000 ppm of Alar and 80 ppm of unsymmetrical dimethyl hydrazide (UDMH), the metabolite of concern. This feeding rate equates to 4 million times the human average daily intake (ADI) or the equivalent of eating 30,000 pounds of apples per day. At that rate 1 in 20,000 of the mice and none of the rats had tumors. The tumors were caused by chemical toxicity and not genetic cancers.

3) Mouse studies conducted by B. Toth have shown that the relative carcinogenic risk or HERP Index calculated for Alar and its by-product UDMH is tenfold lower than the risk from drinking tap water. The HERP Index for a can of beer (2.8%) far exceeds that of an Alar-treated apple (0.0001%). Eating the apple has 30 times less risk than a few pieces of bacon and 300 times less than the risks of eating a peanut butter sandwich each day.

The two-year feeding studies on UDMH will not be completed until January 1990 by EPA guidelines. It is unfortunate that such unrealistic accusations can be made against this chemical when only partial data is available, and that data suggest very negligible risks. Alar, using the same data, could be promoted as an anticancer chemical because the mice given the lowest dose had 2 cases of cancer, the middle dosage had 1 case, the highest dosage resulted in only 8 cases and the untreated and 4 cases.
