Council members at the February 19 meeting discussed how best to handle the property at 410 S. Bridge Street, which the city purchased last year in hopes of expanding Riverside Park. COURT CONTEST AHEAD

Trustee Chuck Stedron's motion not to accept a consent agreement with the developer of a planned multiple housing project brought hearty applause from the contingent of citizens who attended DeWitt Charter Township's Monday evening board meeting. The motion, which the board passed unanimously, followed lengthy and concerned debate over the plan.

The proposed development involves 126 acres on Wood Road between Stoll and Clark roads. In August 1988, U.S. Housing Co., a Michigan corporation, and Clint-Lans, a Michigan co-partnership, which have an option on the land, proposed an extensive development to include 263 mobile homes, 12 modular housing units, 72 townhouses, 54 duplexes and 8 single family dwellings for a total of 463 units. The company asked the township for five zoning classifications to change the acreage from agricultural to greater density housing. Both the township Planning Commission and Board of Trustees denied the request, citing its variance from the township master plan, which calls for potential future development there of low and medium density housing as well as parkland and green space.

When U.S. Housing Co. subsequently sued the township for damages, Judge Timothy Green ruled in the former's favor and suggested the township negotiate the matter. A township committee composed of Supervisor Bob Zeeb, trustees Douglas Hammond and Robert Ancel then discussed the matter with the plaintiffs, working toward the "best possible agreement" if the township was forced to accept the unwanted development. This would have required the developer at his expense to provide water and sewer "up to municipal standards" and cover costs of necessary road improvements.

Referring to the landowner's contention that maintaining the present agricultural zoning deprives him of the use of the property, attorney Jim Tamm stated that a court case would bring about a "battle of experts", with plaintiff's experts saying the acreage can't be developed profitably according to the township master plan and township's experts saying that it can.

Thursday Recycling Project Could Use More Volunteers

Recycling in DeWitt has become very popular and Thursday, March 22, is the next date to bring recyclable materials to Fuerstenau School, W. Washington St., from noon to 7 p.m.

The City of DeWitt pays the Recyclers of Ingham, Eaton and Clinton counties, which is a non-profit organization, \$4,500 to provide a trailer and haul the recyclable materials on a monthly basis. Residents pay a \$1 increase in their quarterly trash pickup fees, while people outside the city limits who bring materials to the drop off site are asked to pay a \$1 fee.

Prepare recyclables as follows. **NEWSPAPER:** Bag in brown paper bags or bundle with twine. Paper should be stacked flat in the bags. No wet paper, magazines, phone books or junk mail. **TIN CANS** (attract a magnet): Rinse clean, remove labels and flatten. Food cans only. No aerosol or paint cans. **ALUMINUM** (does not attract a magnet): Clean and flatten. **BROWN PAPER BAGS:** Just bundle or self-bag. **PLASTIC MILK JUGS:** Rinse clean, remove tops and flatten. Labels are not

township's experts saying that it can.

During the public comment period of the board meeting, area residents who had secured 2,000 names on a petition against the proposed venture when it first surfaced, stated their concerns. Delegates from Wood Road, Craig Street, Pinehurst Drive, Karl Drive, Eskes Street, Boichot Road and Sunnymede said they were tired of subsidizing the six mobile parks currently in the township and cited the heavy traffic which the area roads involved already carry.

Identifying himself as one in a third generation of family farmers, Robert Reese of Wood Road wondered if incoming city dwellers would be prepared for the tractors and slow moving farm machinery on those roads, crop driers which run 24 hours a day and barnyard odors consistent with the raising of calves and pigs. Township engineer Paul Thompson also questioned what the developer's idea of "sewer system" might entail as well as needing to insure a water system up to township standards.

Stedron's motion to allow the matter to go to court rather than settle, stemmed, he said, from the fear that agreeing to this proposal could open up a "Pandora's box of problems" for the township with future developers. The township case now goes before the judge today, March 19, with a trial date expected to be set.

In other board action, engineer Paul Thompson was authorized to spend up to \$4,000 to prepare preliminary plans for extension of the water line east on Herbison Road to US-27; developer Eric Kindlund's fee waiver request for the site plan review on his proposed 170-unit apartment building on State Road was denied; Supt. Ryan Wood was authorized to expend up to \$1,400 for an asbestos check of the township building, and permission was granted two supervisory police officers to contact the Fraternal Order of Police to represent them as a bargaining unit.



CITY COUNCIL NOTES

DeWitt City Council denied confirmation of a special water district assessment roll last Monday night following extensive citizen input at a public hearing preceding the regular council meeting.

City attorney Dan Matson had petitioned for city water when the well failed at his office, 202 E. Washington. The resulting water district drawn up by city engineer Orla McGuire involved a loop from Main Street, which would bring water to South Market, East Washington and South Franklin streets. Residents of the properties on these streets would have been affected by the assessment. A special mayor's report at the next council meeting will reconsider alternative ways of funding the water district. With projected new development on DeWitt Road south of the downtown area, the city believes that extension of water service will be required within a year anyway.

Sign Problems

With building continuing at a steady pace in the DeWitt area, the proliferation of real estate and open house signs, as well as garage and other sale signs, has become a headache for the city. Yet the city's sign ordinance, which prohibits signs in the public right of way (the 66-foot width including road and sidewalks), causes a problem for realtors who must set out directions for people to find their properties. After several realtors explained their predicament, Councilwoman Marie Henning and realtor Chris Ballard were named to a subcommittee to explore options/ solutions and report back at the next meeting.

SEPTEMBER TRIAL DATE

U.S. Housing Co. had sued the township for damages after the Planning Commission and Board of Trustees denied the company's rezoning request. 
