



Rumble strips will alert drivers to the four-way stop signs at the intersection, Clerk Greg Whitlock said.

After listening to comments of nearby King Arthur's Court and Wood Street residents, who did not want an apartment building erected, trustees denied Eric Kindlund's request for rezoning to multiple dwelling on Wood Street north of State road. They approved on first reading the building ordinance amendment to Ordinance 60, which tightens restrictions on multiple unit developments.



Marine Pfc. Brian D. Selfridge, son of Larry R. and Betty L. Selfridge, Forest Hill Road, has completed the Personnel Clerk Course.

During the eight-week course at Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton, California, Selfridge received instruction on the preparation and maintenance of officer and enlisted service records. He also studied preparation of all personnel documents including identification cards, promotion certificates, individual evaluation reports and leave authorizations.

A 1986 graduate of Grand Ledge High School, he joined the Marine Corps in July 1986.

Jail capacity is 42, but the April daily average was 67 prisoners. Overflow prisoners are now transported to jail facilities in other counties, at an average cost to Clinton County of \$30 to \$45 per inmate daily.

According to Sheriff Terry Haneckow, last year's cost of transporting prisoners and housing them elsewhere was \$139,450. Deputies are then required to bring inmates back and forth for court appearances. The county jail has failed to meet code for many years.

Freeway Work Closes Road

Local traffic is being detoured to Upton Road, while State Road between Webster and Peacock roads in Bath Township is closed for construction of the new I-69 Freeway, the Michigan Department of Transportation has announced.

The detour location is approximately one-quarter of a mile north of Temporary Interstate 69.



CITY COUNCIL NOTES

DeWitt City Council accepted the \$10,850 bid of G.H. Ross Co. at the Monday meeting to install a retaining wall and sidewalk on the east side of Wilson Street near Scott School, subject to their meeting contract requirements. Work is to begin right after school closes for the summer, but no sooner than June 15. City workers will install the 120 feet of cyclone fencing needed or else the job will be contracted out.


Fire chief Doug Twiss was authorized to sell \$2,200 in First of America stock, which had been donated toward the fire department's purchase of a Heart-Aid Machine. With these monies and the additional funds which have been raised, the department will be able to order the machine and have it installed in a truck for \$11,028.50 by Medical Devices, Inc. DeWitt's fire department will be the first in the central Michigan area to have a Heart-Aid, Twiss told council.

Purchase of a rescue air bag by the fire department was approved at a cost of \$663.75 from Alert Firefighting Equipment. The reusable bag can be placed against windshield interiors, helping firefighters to pop the windshield out for rescue purposes without breaking the glass, or to lift or spread machinery/equipment in which persons are trapped.




