CCISD Offers Summer Employment for Youth

Jim Davis, Coordinator of Job Training Programs for Clinton County Intermediate School District (CCISD), announced that applications are now being taken for all of the Summer Job programs. Following is a summary of youth employment programs offered by CCISD for this summer:

HIRE-A-YOUTH - This program is for 15-21 year old youth looking for summer employment in private sector jobs. Rate of pay and hours worked will vary depending upon type of job and qualifications. Students will fill out job placement application cards and then CCISD will match students qualifications with employer job orders through a special computer database program.

MICHIGAN YOUTH CORPS - This program is for 18-21 year old unemployed youth who are Michigan residents. The program begins on June 18 and lasts until August 10. Each youth will work 30 hours per week at \$3.80 per hour. All jobs are in the public sector with municipal offices, school districts and non-profit organizations. Jobs vary according to interests and skills of the student.

SUMMER EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING PROGRAM - This program is for 15-21 year old youth who are economically or physically disadvantaged. Program time frame, hours, and pay scale are the same as Michigan Youth Corps. All jobs are in the public sector. Jobs vary according to interests and skills of student.

"We are looking forward to another successful summer employment season," said Davis. "Last summer we placed over 240 youth in the Hire-A-Youth program and 200 in MYC and SYETP. The summer jobs are designed to give students the opportunity to gain valuable work experience as well as earn some money. The program also gives first time workers exposure to the real world of work such as: being to work on time, how to relate to supervisors and co-workers, coping with mistakes and experiencing accomplishments.

Ryan, son of Bobby Ray and the late Scott Ray, asked Lyn Kressler, English and drama teacher at DeWitt High School to be his guest.



WILL YOU BE FINANCIALLY FIT FOR RETIREMENT?

Are you ready to retire? Are you certain that Social Security payments, your pension and your savings will be enough to let you live comfortably after retirement? According to the National Council of Aging, only two of every 100 persons are financially independent at retirement age; 75% of retirees depend on friends, relatives or Social Security payments as their only source of income.

The newsletter series includes a computer form that you can fill out and return to the Extension office to receive a computerized personal financial analysis. This analysis will look at your retirement income needs for the first 10 years of retirement and help you decide if you need to increase your savings and investments now.

The cost for all four newsletters and the personal computer analysis is \$5.00. The newsletters are also available on audio cassettes along with the computer analysis at the same cost.

HEADLEE HEADACHE: The Headlee Amendment, much heralded at the time of its passage, has become a distinct headache for school districts.

In DeWitt, for instance, voters approved specified millage just last year. But, because the assessed valuations of our property increased more than the cost of living, the Headlee Amendment goes into effect, and schools must ask voters a second time for the same money that they've already approved. Confusing, wot?

In other words, because local assessments increased faster than the cost of living, the community must vote to continue levying previously authorized millage. DeWitt schools receive operational dollars from local taxes and from the state. When taxes are collected because assessments are up, the money the district receives from the state drops dramatically. The state benefits from the higher assessments, but the schools don't.

If DeWitt schools do not get this message clearly across to voters, they face a loss of \$430,000 in operating monies. So, the school board at their May 14 meeting had to look at three packages of proposed budget cuts - for programs which had already been budgeted.

Such cuts could include elimination of all classroom aides and library aide, elimination of middle school athletics and reducing high school athletics, reducing computer budget, increasing class size and eliminating some school staff.

City Council Notes

New sidewalks will not be installed on Wilson Street near Scott Elementary School, as requested earlier this year by residents who expressed concern for pupils' safety. City Council turned down the request following a Monday night public hearing, at which seven of 11 Wilson Street residents, who would be affected by special assessments for new sidewalks, spoke against the measure.

The traffic control order, restricting Wilson Street parking to the hours of 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. on school days, was approved. This means that tickets can now be issued to violators of the order.

Council agreed to the traditional closing of downtown streets for the DeWitt Ox Roast, covering the period from noon Friday to noon Sunday of the August 18 weekend. Tethered hot air balloon rides were also given the nod of approval for the ox roast.

In an endeavor to speed up enforcement of the city's junk car vehicle ordinance, council directed Attorney Dan Matson and Police Chief Wendell Myers to refine the ordinance language to help deter repeat offenders. Street lighting was approved for four of the city's newest developments - Springbrook Lakes, Springbrook IV, Mallory Woods and Fairway Ridge.

After hearing the city attorney's report on usage of city-owned cemetery property, council directed the Parks & Recreation Department to prepare a presentation for the Cemetery Board on their proposal to construct softball diamonds and soccer field on city land behind the cemetery. A new Porta-Potty was also okayed for McGuire Park. The zoning amendment upgrading the city's ordinance was approved on second reading.

Council agreed to the fire department's request to install a 1,030 square foot concrete slab in order to fill fire trucks from the hydrant. Department of Public Works and firemen will install the forms and concrete with Ron Mull and Tom Kirchen supervising. They will purchase concrete and sealer for \$1,152.90.
