

Tuesday Is Election Day

Polls will open for the general election Tuesday, November 4, at 7 a.m. and remain open until 8 p.m.

Voters will be asked to choose state, congressional, legislative, non-partisan and some local officials, and approve several state proposals.

Clinton County voters will have an opportunity to approve 1 mill for 20 years for a badly needed new 80-bed county jail. The present jail houses only 42 prisoners and the county is paying an estimated \$100,000 a year in fees to transport and board additional prisoners elsewhere.

Citizens Address Safety Issues for School Pupils

DeWitt Citizens for the Safety of Children En Route to/from School has outlined the following problem areas and made recommendations:

City council is studying the issue and will report back at its November 3 meeting. The school board has also promised cooperation.

THE PROBLEM

There exist unsafe conditions in the city of DeWitt for school children walking to and from the schools of Scott and Fuerstenau. This problem is magnified when certain weather situations are present, such as:

- [a] rain [low visibility; greatly increased traffic]
- [b] snow [slippery conditions; lack of ice/snow removal from citizens' walks; piled up snow causing low or blockage of vision [to children and motorists] and the necessity of small children walking [unseen to motorists] around these snowbanks, often/usually in the street; again, greatly increased traffic].

The problems essentially consist of the following:

- [1] an absence of sidewalks [in areas where a higher density of children are walking]
- [a] no continuous sidewalk on either side of Wilson to Scott School
- [b] no walks on portions of Dartmouth between Manchester/Wilson
- [c] no walks on either side of Madison between Scott/Wilson
- [d] no walks on either side of Logan between Washington/Main.

[2] a lack of crossing guards; [3] a lack of "SLOW" speed signs; [4] a lack of adequately-painted crosswalks [or none at all]; [5] excessive speed of vehicles in areas of schools; [6] congested traffic situation in the immediate location of Scott School; [7] high level of traffic which peaks at students' arrival/departure to/from school.



[1] the distance from school a walker must live before being eligible to ride the bus
 [2] present bus routes seem inadequate/inappropriate/unfair in some instances
 [3] using Fuerstenau/middle/high school students as safety patrols [safety patrol program, although desirable, need not go hand-in-hand with crossing guards]
 [4] changing time for starting school at Fuerstenau, so students can serve as safety patrols
 [5] citizenship program at Fuerstenau including safety patrol program
 [6] traffic congestion at Scott School [work with city]
 [7] parents using new bus drive at Scott School to pick students up after buses are in formation
 [8] parking needs for Scott School
 [9] walking routes



the fiscal year which begins in January, at their October 27 meeting.

A group of township residents attended the board meeting to protest the budget increase. On a 4-3 board vote, approval was given for a 5 percent pay increase for Clerk Gregory Whitlock and Treasurer Catherine Reed; a 14 percent increase has been suggested.

Township Supervisor Frank Mann's salary goes from \$9,000 a year to \$26,000, because he took over many of the township services coordinator's duties last year following the death of Tom Woodruff. Woodruff had been full-time services coordinator and assessor.

The board also agreed to lay off two secretaries, one in Reed's office and one in the police department. Former township treasurer Eileen Coor suggested retaining the two employees and skipping the staff raises.

Two new police officers will take up their duties this month, replacing officers who had left the township police department. George Bartoszek of Livonia joins the force November 3; Mark Nelson of Du and begins work November 10.

Pandora Ashley, N. East Street, was also approved as a probationary member of the township fire department, provided that she passes the physical examination.

FOUNDATION GRATEFUL: As they launch their program for the coming year, the DeWitt Public Schools Foundation again wishes to thank all the underwriters, prize donors, and participants in their second annual Scramble Golf Tournament. SCHOOL SAFETY

Representatives of the parents concerned about walking school children's safety attended Monday's council meeting to hear the city's response to their recommendations. [City clerk Margie Lotre received phone calls of appreciation on Tuesday, she said, after the city DPW crew had implemented several suggestions - painting crosswalks on the school route and erecting "SLOW School Children" signs in town.]

City council and school administrators are cooperating on plans to install new sidewalks near the elementary schools, but that project will have to wait until spring, since it is too late in the year to pour concrete. 

COOKING TIPS ENHANCE FLAVOR OF WILD GAME

The meat from wild game tends to be leaner than that of domestic animals or poultry and so tends to be drier and potentially tougher. Take care when cooking wild game to use methods that will add juice and retain flavor.

COOKING TIPS

1. Thaw frozen game meat completely in the refrigerator. Thawing

tends to become rancid quickly, contributes to "gamey" flavors and odors.

3. Add other fats to keep game meats from becoming too dry, using one of the following methods:

--Rub a roast with salt pork, butter, margarine, beef suet, bacon fat, or

sweet or sour cream to add moisture, richness, and flavor.

--Baste very lean cuts with additional fat to improve flavor.

--"Lard" your lean game meat by inserting silvers of uncooked salt pork or bacon with a skewer or ice pick. If you make your own rolled roasts, add beef or pork fat to the inside and the outside of the roast before

Bring in amount of firewood that can be used up in a couple of days. Keep it stacked in the cold portions of the house [i.e. the garage or unheated porch].

3. Do not leave firewood in the house over the summer. 4. Do not treat firewood with insecticide. It is unnecessary and expensive.





Holiday Ham Can Provide Meal Variety

Soon the holiday season will be upon us and those festive holiday meals will start. Ham is a wonderful dish to serve when the crowd comes and you want something special.

When you purchase a canned ham, be sure to read and follow the storage directions. As their labels indicate, canned hams require refrigeration. If left unrefrigerated for more than four hours, they could be dangerous and should be discarded.

Canned hams which require refrigeration are pasteurized--not sterilized--products. Pasteurization lowers the number of spoilage organisms present in a product, but does not reduce it to zero. Refrigeration is necessary to keep the remaining organisms from multiplying. If a canned ham is held at room temperature, these organisms can grow, making the product unfit for consumption. The recommended refrigerator storage time for an unopened canned ham is six months. Once opened, it should be kept refrigerated and used within a week.

When cooking your ham, you might baste it with ginger ale, pineapple juice or apple cider. Or you may want to use a glaze of 1 1/3 cups brown

Should we be concerned about cholesterol?

As producers, consumers and promoters of red meats, eggs and dairy products the answer to the question is YES!

Cholesterol is a fat-related substance found in the cells and blood of every living animal. That includes you! Cholesterol is used by our bodies for the production of cell membranes and hormones. Therefore it is essential.

However, cholesterol is also a major component in plaque, which can build up in arteries if the blood level of cholesterol is too high. This build-up can sometimes lead to complete blockage of an artery and therefore can lead to a heart attack or stroke. This is where cholesterol gets its bad name.

levels are determined by many factors. The primary factor is genetic makeup.

Approximately 80% of the cholesterol in blood is produced by liver. The remaining 20% is from dietary sources. So, although the diet contributes only a small percentage of the total cholesterol, it is one of the only means of varying the blood level of cholesterol.

The reduction of cholesterol should not have to eliminate the consumption of meat, egg, and dairy products. Develop ways of preparing foods that will reduce their cholesterol levels. For instance, trim the fat off of your meat before you cook it. Don't insist on prime meat. The marbling is fat.

Develop recipes which include more egg white and less egg yolks; the yolks are the part that contain the cholesterol, and use skim milks.

When cooking your ham, you might baste it with ginger ale, pineapple juice or apple cider. Or you may want to use a glaze of 1 1/3 cups brown sugar, 2 tsps dry mustard and 1/3 cup bread crumbs. Garnish with cranberries and orange slices or cherries and pineapple slices.

Leftover ham must be kept refrigerated to avoid spoilage and prevent food poisoning. Refrigerate immediately after mealtime. Allowing foods, especially meat and egg dishes, to stand at room temperature is a warm invitation for food poisoning bacteria to develop.

Leftover ham can be delicious. You can grind it, add celery and onions and mayonnaise and use it as a sandwich filling. Or cut ham into chunks and use it in dishes such as scalloped potatoes and ham. Dried split peas, chunked ham and assorted vegetables make a hearty split pea and ham soup. Ham leftovers can be used in crepes. And don't forget your leftover ham at breakfast time: fry it and serve with eggs, or dice it and use it in omelets.



Michigan Apples Are At Their Best Now

Apples are in peak season right now and they are delicious! The "Big Four" of Michigan apples are Jonathon, Ida Red, McIntosh and Delicious. Though Michigan produces many other varieties, these four account for the majority of the commercial apple crop grown in the state.

Consumers who prefer the old-fashioned varieties, such as Rome or Northern Spy, have the best chance of finding them at a farm market. The big four are considered all-purpose apples. This means they can be used for cooking, eating raw, salads, and applesauce.

Romes are still considered the best apples for baking, regardless of whether you cook them in a microwave or in a conventional oven. They are

large and don't get mushy, and if you leave the skin on, it tends not to crack during baking.

Northern Spies are considered perfect pie apples, because they are tart and hold their shape during cooking. It generally takes only five or six Northern Spies to make a pie. With all the rain we have received this year, the Spies should be unusually large.

Apples should be stored in a cold, moderately moist environment. This means a temperature between 30 to 32 degrees and a relative humidity of around 85 percent. If stored under these conditions, apples will keep eight weeks or longer. Of the big four, McIntosh are the poorest keepers and Ida Reds are the best, depending on the state of maturity when picked and stored.

PRIME TIME FOR FAMILY STRESS

This time of year can be extremely stressful on families. The holidays are coming, the weather is temperamental and a lot of work needs to be done before winter sets in.

How you react to all this pressure will make a big difference to whether or not you will be able to cope with the stress in your life. By becoming more aware of what stress is and how you can fight against it, you will be more equipped to deal with stress when it does invade your life. Here are some commonly asked questions/answers regarding stress.

Q. Why are diet and exercise important in being able to cope with stress?

A. An individual's physical condition and level of fitness will be important in his/her ability to withstand stressful

inducing relaxation.

Q. Stress is a natural consequence of what these families are going through and can even be helpful in helping them solve the problem. How does a family know if it's coping all right or not?

A. Families who aren't coping very well will find themselves bickering and nitpicking more than usual, withdrawing from one another, or becoming more verbally or physically abusive. On the other hand, those who are coping positively will: 1) attack the problem, rather than one another; 2) maintain self-esteem, rather than allowing it to be torn down; 3) preserve relationships, rather than tossing them away too easily; and 4) handle any anxiety or depression that becomes overwhelming by seeking professional help before it disables them or the family.

People who watch the amounts of fat, salt, and sugar in their diets are less inclined to be overweight or have clogged arteries that lead to stroke or heart attack in situations of acute distress. Exercise "blows out" cholesterol, allows the release of tension, and exercises the cardiovascular system so that it is more efficient in its ability to withstand stress.

Q. What's wrong with using tranquilizers and alcohol to relax? They work.

A. Dependence on certain substances such as tranquilizers, alcohol, and sleeping pills tends to significantly reduce REM [or dream] sleep. This is when we work out some of our daytime anxiety. When REM sleep is reduced night after night, it will result in more daytime anxiety and increased dependence on these chemicals. There are better alternatives for

before it causes them or the family.

Q. There are a lot of coping "strategies" that people can use in reacting to too much stress. Recognizing that people aren't going to change a lot of their behaviors when they're under pressure, what would be the most important coping strategies for seeing some instant results in stress coping?

A. Important strategies include: 1] not over-reacting to the problem; 2] eliminating negative inner chatter [I'll never survive this!; "this will never work!"] and replacing it with positive self-talk [I've been through other tough times!; "I'm not a quitter!"]; 3] maintaining routines and networks with other persons; 4] vigorously exercising 30 minutes per day to relieve tension; and 5] getting proper nutrition and enough rest and sleeps. These strategies are not solutions to a problem but can enable a healthier reaction, particularly if the stress will be ongoing.

ATV users need to exercise extra caution when driving these recreational vehicles. No one's fun should be spoiled by a preventable accident. People may be able to avoid a serious accident by following these safety tips:

[1] Read the owner's manual, noting all operating, safety, and maintenance instructions. [2] Young people shouldn't operate an ATV unless they are old enough to handle it safely. Beginning riders should practice driving an ATV first on level ground before moving to rough or unfamiliar territory. [3] A helmet, eye protection, boots, gloves, pants and a long-sleeved shirt are important personal protection equipment and clothing.

[4] Never carry passengers, but do try to travel with another ATV user when riding in unfamiliar areas. [5] Don't drink and drive. [6] Don't ride on public roads, and observe local laws regarding ATV use. [7] Use common sense. Don't travel at excessive speeds and be alert for obstacles.
