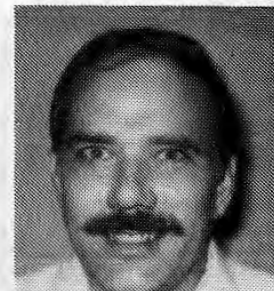
VOTERS TO MAKE CHOICES ON CANDIDATES, NEW JAIL

Polls throughout Clinton County will open at 7 a.m. Tuesday, November 3, as voters cast their ballots to determine the fate of a one-mill, 20-year bond proposal aimed at financing construction of a new jail facility. In DeWitt Township, increased voter turnout is expected, as residents decide who will occupy four recalled positions.

Eleven choices to replace four recalled officials in DeWitt Township will be offered as voters choose a supervisor, clerk,

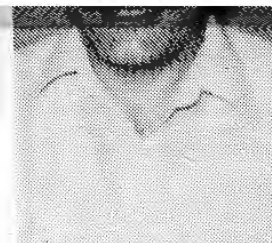
Church News

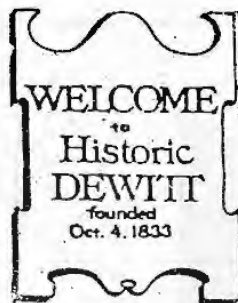

CITY COUNCIL NOTES

The City of DeWitt now has an Environmental Affairs Committee, as a result of action at last Monday's regular council meeting. The EAC replaces the former Sewer & Water Committee, explained administrative assistant Kurt Klemens, expanding its scope of influence to include groundwater contamination, air pollution and other environmental issues.

First matter to be referred to the EAC was Klemens' recommendation to council proposing a ban on leaf burning in the city or an alternate method of leaf disposal. In response to complaints from citizens who have lung or allergy problems, Klemens has prepared a memo citing an extensive DNR report on high levels of carbon monoxide and other irritants linked to lung difficulties and lung cancer. The Environmental Affairs Committee was asked to work toward a solution in time for next fall's leaf burning season.

Location of a fire department building involved lengthy discussion. While a site behind city hall had been recommended, easy access for fire vehicles is a problem and council members are still undecided on the proper location.

Since the city is dissatisfied with DeWitt Board of Education's proposal to provide permanent maintenance on the Wilson Street sidewalk installed this past year at the request of pupils' parents, council moved that a letter go to the board asking for reconsideration of the

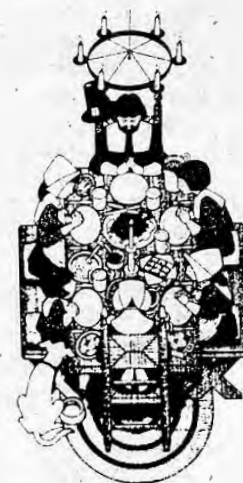

scores, presented by Kay Hannah, Fuerstenau School principal, at the November meeting of the Board of Education.

Students in fourth, seventh, and tenth grades had taken the MEAP tests in September, which measure mathematics and reading skills areas against selected objectives. Consensus was that DeWitt staff and students are to be complimented on their fine performance on the statewide tests.

DeWitt Middle School principal Earl Roseberry stated in his report that "this year's MEAP results reflect a substantial improvement in our math scores which is not entirely accidental. The scores are obviously from a different group of seventh graders, but are also indicative of a concerted effort to improve."

Roseberry pointed out that although the reading scores were high, results tended to "show a need for more motivation or incentives for self-generated reading."

The 10th grade report, made by DeWitt High School counselor William Rushcamp, asserts, "In Reading, 95.5 percent of our tenth grade class scored in level four (highest category)." While none of the 24 reading objectives was seen as a problem area, Rushcamp said that six students were identified who could benefit from individual or supplementary reading services.

Rushcamp reported that although 84.2 percent of the 10th grade class scored in level four, two of the 28 math objectives (both involving fractions) were seen as problem areas.

DeWitt Public Schools seems to be doing a good job in teaching its students minimal competency skills in the areas of reading and mathematics, Rushcamp concluded, and "We are listed as a low needs school in both areas."

Despite this, he said, students are still progressing through the system (low average, but not special education) who need supplemental services that will allow them to achieve to their highest potential. "They need to be addressed, not just at the elementary level, but at the secondary level as well," his report stated.

SOUND SNACKING HABITS CAN BENEFIT NUTRITION

You may have noticed that the amount of snacking going on at your house has just increased dramatically. That's because the kids are back in school and when they get home, they are hungry.

Is snacking A) an unhealthy lapse in sound eating habits or B) a reasonable way to get good nutrition into a busy life? According to an analysis of the eating habits of 37,000 Americans, B) is the correct answer. Surprised?

Many people have equated snacking with eating high-calorie, low-nutrient foods. But for about 20 percent of us, snacks provide 20 percent of the day's caloric and other nutritional needs. The data from a USDA survey illustrate that snacking is not all bad.

Even teens benefit from snacking. Their snack choices were found to be high in important nutrients that teens often don't get enough of -- vitamins A and C, calcium, and magnesium. Some of the foods that adolescents chose regularly were frozen fruit bars, yogurt

You may feel that some foods are not appropriate snack foods. It is probably best not to even buy those foods. Why tempt a potential snacker, especially if you can't be there to supervise? But remember that foods aren't good or bad by themselves. A few cookies taste great with a glass of milk and an occasional chip is not going to harm an otherwise balanced diet.

- 1 C. all purpose flour
- $\frac{3}{4}$ C. sugar (half packed brown, if desired)
- 1 t. baking powder
- 1 t. soda
- 1 t. salt
- 2 t. pumpkin pie spice or cinnamon
- $\frac{1}{2}$ C. cooking oil
- 2 eggs
- $\frac{1}{2}$ C. chopped nuts, optional
- 1 C. cooked or canned pumpkin

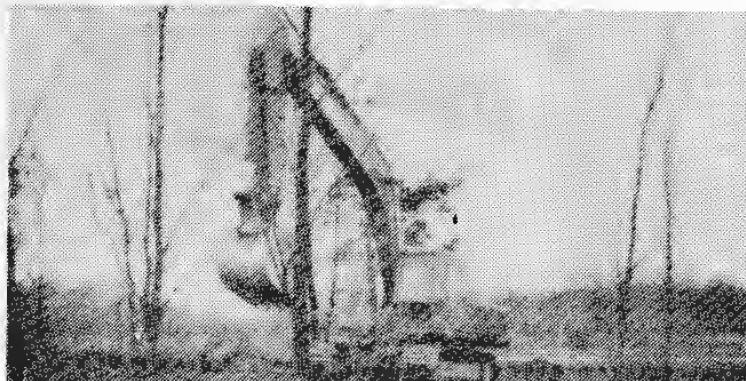

FAMILY FOCUS

Food Safety

The holiday season is almost here, bringing family, friends, and loved ones together to share delicious feasts. But unless you pay special attention to food safety, you and your dear ones may also share the unpleasant, and possibly dangerous, symptoms of food poisoning.

Often people mistake foodborne illness and its symptoms for a simple "bug" or 24 hour flu. The real cause could be a food poisoning at holiday time. Attention to certain details can minimize the risk of holiday food poisoning.

Don't buy perishable groceries too far in advance of the holiday. Allow enough time to thaw frozen foods, especially meat and poultry in the refrigerator.

When preparing foods in your kitchen, minimize the spread of bacteria from one food to another. Wash hands, kitchen utensils and cutting boards with soap and water after handling one food and before moving on to the next. Bake stuffing separately from the turkey for absolute safety.

One of the peak snacking times for many children is immediately after school. Frequently they have no parental supervision at this time. With careful planning, parents can assure that a variety of foods that are high in nutrients are available for snacking.

Keep plenty of peak quality fresh fruits and vegetables on hand. Make a lowfat yogurt or cottage cheese dip for dipping, or better yet, teach the kids how to make one. Whole grain bread and cereal products also make good snacks -- crackers, bagels, ready-to-eat cereals, etc. Keep plenty of milk, yogurt, and cheese handy, too.

on bottom with wax paper. Shield ends of loaf with 2 in. wide strips of foil, covering 1 in. batter and molding remainder around handles. Center loaf dish on inverted saucer in oven. Microwave at 50% (Medium) 9 minutes, rotating ¼ turn every 3 minutes. Remove foil. Increase power to High. Microwave 2 to 5 minutes. If using clear glass dish, check for doneness by looking through bottom. No unbaked batter should appear in center. Let stand 5 to 10 minutes before removing from dish.

Variations: Carrot Nut Bread, substitute 1½ cups shredded carrots for the pumpkin. Zucchini Bread, substitute 1½ cups shredded, unpared zucchini for the pumpkin. Applesauce Bread, substitute 1 cup sweetened applesauce for the pumpkin.

When serving food buffet-style, use small serving dishes and replenish them often directly from the refrigerator or stove. If you know a perishable food has been handled carelessly or left out at room temperature for more than two hours, throw it out.

To prevent food-borne illness from spoiling your holiday get-together, follow these three basic rules: keep food hot, keep food cold, keep food clean -- and enjoy safe holiday feasting.
