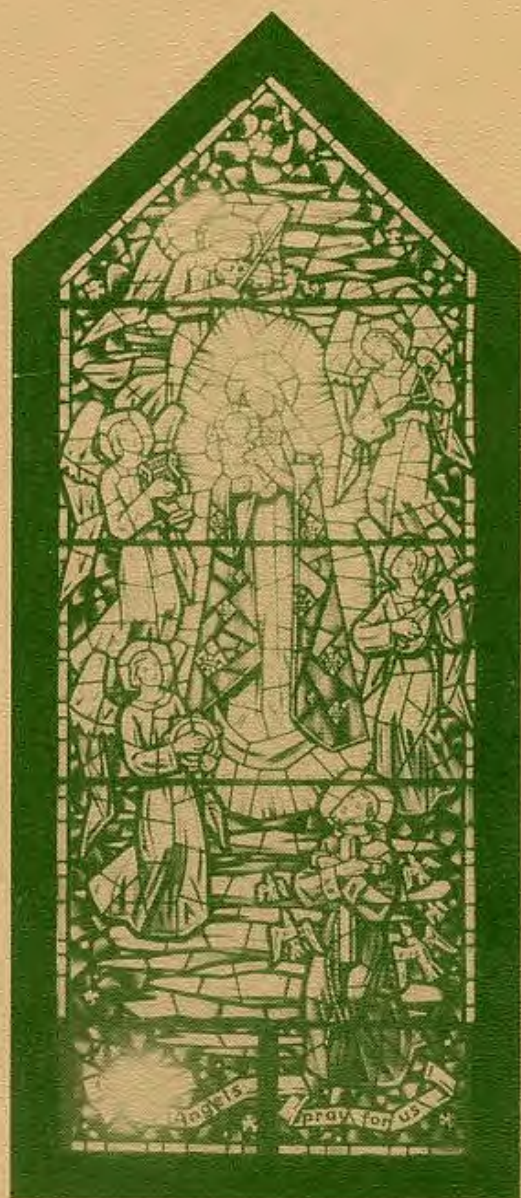

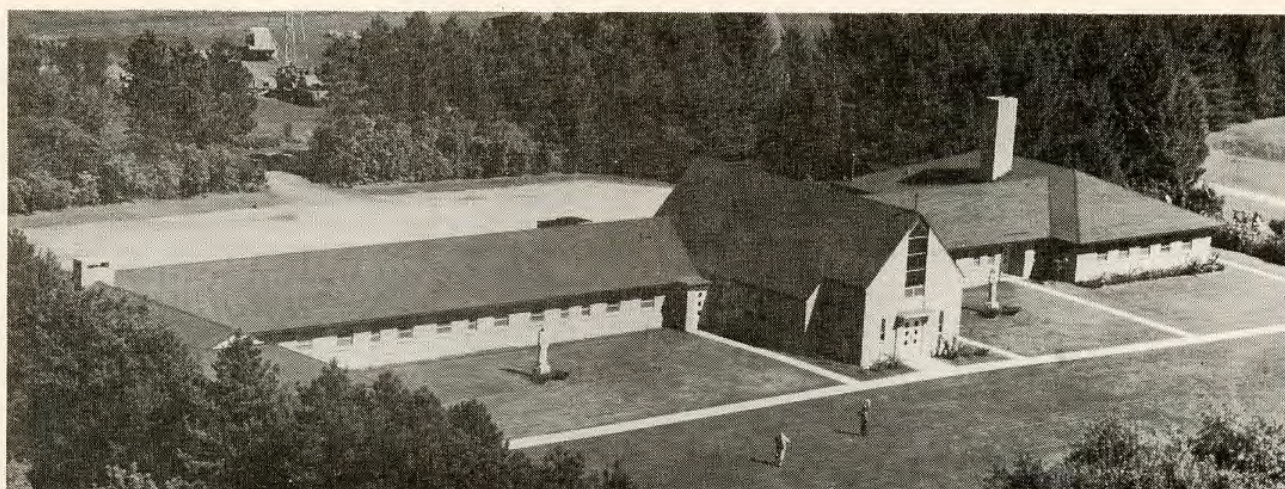

The Surratt Property

The Franciscan Friars' friary and retreat house is built on the former property of Sylvester C. and Florence A. Surratt. Mr. Surratt's ancestors were closely related to Mary Surratt who was convicted and hanged on July 7, 1865 as an alleged conspirator in the murder of President Lincoln. The property was a part of the Treadwell family farm. The Surratts acquired 35 acres of this farm in the 1920s, built a rustic field-stone residence, and landscaped the whole property at the cost of thousands of dollars and countless hours of labor. By 1954 the Surratts reached the age where they could no longer do the massive yard work themselves. Their children were now grown and lived in other cities. They decided to sell the property at the same time as the Franciscan Friars were looking for a location for their friary and retreat house. The friars purchased the property on May 10, 1954.

The real estate agency described the property in these terms: "Thirty-five acres of verdant landscape, bedecked by hundreds of towering, whispering pines of every sort indigenous to this climate . . . flower gardens to delight the appreciative eye . . . carefully trimmed hedges . . . and believe it or not, there is a sporty, nine-hole golf course." There was also a landing strip for small planes. The landing strip and the golf course are gone--but the rest of the property still stands in its inspiring beauty.

In 1966 there was danger that the vacant acres just a few feet west of the boundary of the property would be developed into housing. In order to acquire this land it was necessary to buy the remaining 80 acres of the Treadwell farm. Purchase was completed in 1967. The City of DeWitt bought 20 acres for cemetery use and the friars 60 acres. These acres were cleared and slowly developed by the retreat house staff.

These 95 acres are awaiting the retreatant when he comes to DeWitt. Acres of silent serenity conducive to prayer and reflection. Acres of natural beauty raising the spirit high above the world to God. Acres refreshing to body and soul.

The Franciscans of DeWitt

The Franciscan Friars who own and operate the Retreat House in DeWitt are members of the Custody of St. John Capistran with headquarters in Roebling, N.J. A custody is a small unit in the Franciscan Order which--although in a different country--depends on the Province that established it. This Custody was established by and canonically depends on the Hungarian Province of St. John Capistran. Under the present circumstances it is directly subject to the Superior General of the order in Rome.

The Franciscans in Hungary

The Order of Friars Minor (O.F.M.) was founded in Assisi, Italy by St. Francis in 1209. For the first ten years of its existence the order worked almost exclusively in Italy. In 1219 St. Francis sent some of his Friars to various countries of Europe--among them to Hungary. This first attempt to establish a Franciscan presence in Hungary was an utter failure. In 1228 some Friars were sent to that country from the Province of Germany. This time the mission was successful. The Order took root on Hungarian soil and by 1239 developed into the independent Province of Hungary. Since then the order has always played an important role in the life of the Hungarian Church.

The Hungarian Franciscans in the U.S.A.

In 1900 the order had three Provinces in Hungary: St. Mary, St. John Capistran, and St. Stephen. After the

first World War that part of the country where the Province of St. Stephen worked became part of Rumania. In spite of their Rumanian citizenship they remained Hungarian and continued to work in the Hungarian speaking parishes of that country.

The immigration of Hungarians to America began during the last decade of the 19th century and continued in this century till the beginning of world war one. After the war it resumed again. To care for the spiritual needs of these people the Hungarian bishops sent dioc-

san priests to the U.S. After the first world war the Hungarian religious orders were also asked to send priests to the States and to participate in the pastoral care of Hungarian speaking citizens. All three Hungarian Provinces did so. By 1931 the members of the Province of St. John Capistran were strong enough to be established as the Custody of the same title. Later the Friars of the Province of St. Stephen were formed into a Custody. The Friars of the Province of St. Mary work in either one of these two.

The Most Rev. Joseph H. Albers, Bishop of Lansing, turns the first spade of dirt as ground was broken Oct. 22, 1959 for a new Franciscan Monastery at the Portiuncula in the Pines Retreat House.

Our Custody has two Friaries: Our Lady of the Assumption in Roebling, N.J. (the mother-house) and Our Lady Queen of the Angels of the Portiuncula in DeWitt, Mi. It has perpetual care of the Holy Assumption parish in Roebling, N.J. and administers five other parishes: St. Ladislaus in New Brunswick, N.J.--Blessed Sacrament in Burton, Mi.--Holy Cross in Detroit, Mi.--St. Emeric in Milwaukee, Wisc.--St. Anthony, Winnipeg, Canada. One of its priests participates in the pastoral care of the Hungarian speaking people of the parish of St. Stephen in New York City. One serves as chaplain of the Monastery of Discalced Carmelite Nuns in Flemington, N.J. One is professor of Dogmatic Theology at Fordham University in New York City. One is member of the William Ockham research team at St. Bonaventure University, N.J.

The Custody in Michigan

Due to the illness of Rev. Anthony Csaky the parish of St. Joseph in Flint for Hungarian speaking people became vacant in 1947. Bishop Joseph Albers invited the Custody of St. John Capistran to assume the administration of that parish. The Friars cared for the spiritual needs of the people of St. Joseph's till 1973. In that year the church, hall, and rectory fell victim to the urban renewal. Since the parish was not strong enough to build its own plant somewhere else in Flint, Bishop Alexander Zaleski united the parish with Blessed Sacrament in Burton. This made it necessary to conduct services in both English and Hungarian. Bishop Zaleski asked the Custody to take charge of Blessed Sacrament

parish and serve both the English and Hungarian speaking faithful. Over the 32 years we have served the people of God in the diocese of Lansing.

In 1929 the Hungarian Province of St. John Capistran assumed administration of the Apostolic Prefecture of Paoking in China. After twenty four years of zealous labor among the Chinese the Friars were ousted by the Communist Government. Since they could not return to Hungary, they came to the United States. Five priests and three Brothers joined our ranks. This necessitated the establishment of a new Friary. Bishop Albers was approached and asked to allow the Friars to build a Friary in his diocese. During the conversation with the bishop the idea of a retreat house came up. Permission was eventually granted the Friars to build a Friary and a retreat house in the Lansing area. After careful consideration the Surratt property in DeWitt was selected as the location of the retreat house and Friary. For twenty five years the Friars of DeWitt have conducted retreats and days of recollection for thousands. They have also helped in parishes, preached missions and Forty Hours, taught C.C.D. classes and classes of theology in various parishes of the diocese.

The Retreat House

The Surratts left the premises at the end of June 1954. Brother Juniper Thee came over from St. Joseph's parish in Flint to take care of the house and property until the permanent staff would arrive. On September 1, 1954 Fr. Maximus Mandl and Brother Steven Csordos arrived and took up residence in the Surratt home. Shortly thereafter Bishop Albers and Fr.

Julian Fuzer, Provincial Superior of the Friars asked Simpson and Hartwick Architects of Lansing to draw up the blueprints for the retreat house.

By February, 1955 the blueprints were completed and given out for bids. The Vandenberg Construction Co. of East Lansing was awarded the contract. On March 1, 1955 Bishop Albers and Fr. Julian blessed and broke the ground for the retreat house in the presence of several members of the clergy and friends of the friars. By June 26, 1955 the construction was so far advanced that the blessing of the cornerstone could be undertaken. Bishop Albers conducted the ritual in the presence of the friars, many priests of the diocese, the officials of DeWitt, and hundreds of the faithful. A much larger number of priests and laypeople were present when Bishop Albers blessed the completed retreat house on October 9, 1955. At both ceremonies the honor guard of the Fourth Degree K. of C. graced the occasion.

The retreat house is a one story building. The original part of it consisted of a chapel in the center, a conference room on one end, the dining room and kitchen on the other. Between these main parts of the building 24 single bedrooms lined up. From the end where the conference room was located another row of 10 bedrooms went in a northerly direction.

While the construction work was going on Fr. Maximus Mandl visited all the parishes of the diocese--with the exception of the southwestern part. The pastors and officers of parish organizations cooperated beautifully in organizing retreat groups of both men and women. The first men's group to make a retreat at DeWitt was sponsored by the Fourth Degree of K. of C. of Lansing. The first group of ladies was the Catholic Business Women of Flint. Both were here in November of 1955. During the same time Fr. Julian and Fr. Maximus composed and published a manual of prayers for the retreatants. Folders with pictures of the retreat house and of the grounds were also printed and sent to the parishes to be distributed.

In a few years the retreat house proved to be too small. An addition was built in 1963, consisting of an office, two rooms for the friars in charge of the retreat house, a religious gift shop, a second conference room, a priests chapel with eleven altars, and sixteen more bedrooms. The new part was so arranged and attached to the older section as to form a square court yard. The lawn, the shrubs, and a few trees in it enhance the beauty of the retreat house.

Friary

When the first two friars arrived in DeWitt on September 1, 1954 they lived in the Surratt residence. A few months later they were joined by a young man from Lansing who became Brother Kenneth Ghastin. After the construction of the retreat house had been completed three more friars and three candidates were transferred to DeWitt. Some continued to live in the Surratt home and others occupied rooms in the retreat house.

To free the rooms of the retreat house occupied by the friars and to bring the whole community under one roof it was decided to build a friary. Work was begun in November of 1959. On September 15, 1960 the new friary was solemnly dedicated by Bishop Albers in the presence of the friars, the diocesan clergy and hundreds of the laity.

The friary has two wings. In the east-west wing are the chapel, the library, the recreation room, the dining room and the kitchen. In the basement of this wing are the workshops of the Brothers. In the south-north wing are the private quarters of the friars. This wing is a two story structure.

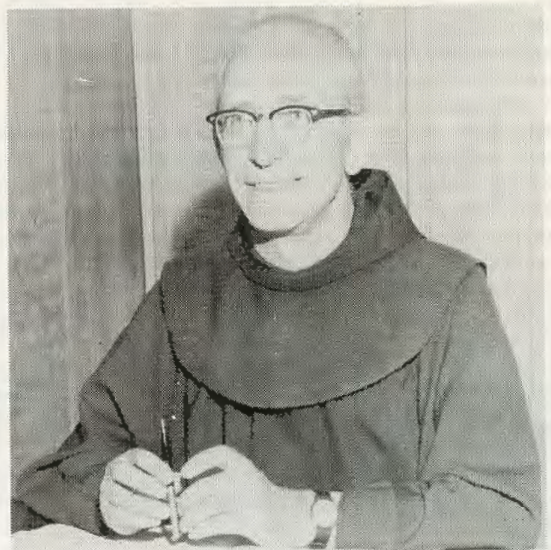

Retreat Masters Who Have Served at the Franciscan Retreat House

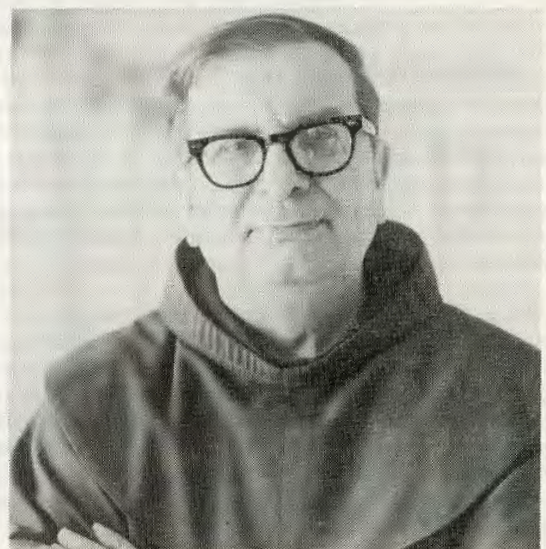


Fr. Julian Fuzer, O.F.M., was born May 30, 1915 in Hehalom, Hungary, and entered the order August 29, 1933. He was ordained a priest July 13, 1941. He received his Licenciante in Theology at St. Anthony, Rome, in 1943 and Doctor of Philosophy degree at the Pontifical Gregorian University, Rome, in 1946. He was provincial superior from 1950 to 1958 and retreat master at the Franciscan Retreat House, DeWitt, from 1962 to 1970. Presently he is pastor of St. Ladislaus Church, New Brunswick, New Jersey.



Fr. Capistran Polgar, O.F.M., was born May 16, 1940 in New Brunswick, New Jersey, and entered the order August 15, 1958. He was ordained a priest June 2, 1967 and served as retreat master at the Franciscan Retreat House in DeWitt from 1971 to 1979. He presently is pastor at Holy Assumption Church, Roebling, New Jersey.

Fr. Maximus Mandl, O.F.M., was born September 6, 1917 in Lippo, Hungary. He entered the order August 29, 1934 and was ordained a priest July 13, 1941. He received his Licenciante in Theology at St. Anthony, Rome, in 1943 and did post graduate work in Sacred Scripture from 1943 to 1945. He was retreat master at the Franciscan Retreat House, DeWitt, from 1955 to 1962, 1970-71 and from 1979 to the present. He was provincial superior from 1964 to 1973.
